BERLIN SUBWAY CAVES IN; FEAR EIGHTEEN DEAD

Section of Street Collapses; Water Main Broken and Tunnel Flooded; Four Injured Men Brought Out.

Berlin, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Eighteen workers were reported missing today in the collapse of a portion of the new underground subway in Berlin, now under construction. A section of the street near the Brandenburg gate, about 12 1/2 p. m., and one of the quarters hours later, only four men were brought out. The rest were believed to be buried under the rubble. The police, first aid workers, and 300 regular fire soldiers were sent to the spot in trucks and ambulances.

The whole tunnel was reported to have caved in, but no details were available today. A street car passed over the heavy traffic jammed area.

The accident occurred directly before the Brandenburg gate. The new subway is to connect the Alexander and Friedrichstrasse railway stations.

Six Samuel Heine, foreign secretary, and Anthony Eden, minister for League of Nations affairs, already are working on an outline of policy to be submitted to Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin, who is returning from Aix-les-Bains, France.

It was reiterated that Great Britain and France had agreed informally to work in co-operation in the Italo-Ethiopian crisis, but that there had been no formal agreement.

Authoritative quarters stated that the British government does not intend to send troops to the Lake Tana region of Ethiopia to protect British rights.

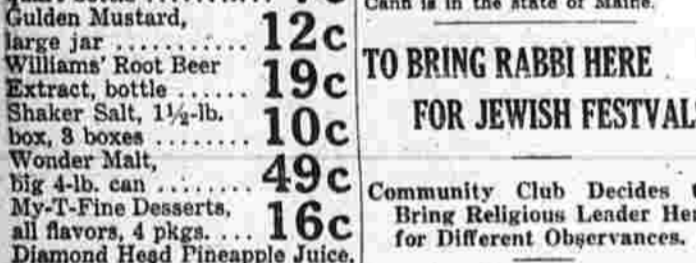

A SAVING LESSON

Europe is astounded and frightened at the belief that it has been heading toward which it has been heading through its excess of nationalism and its determination to maintain the matter of the time factor, not immediately in mind, precipitated by the Italo-Rhinian crisis. The worst it is that the danger is probably as real as it seems.

In view of the situation it is conceivable that the dire times through which our country has been going for the last six years may turn out to have been a thickly disguised blessing. One may well entertain the hope that the present situation as the present had it seem while we were still suffering from the delusions of grandeur that ruled the nation in the latter 1920's.
