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FILLED TOBACCO

SHED IS BURNED

High Grade Shade Grown

Variety Lost in Blaze at Hackett Plantation.

Jensen was first elected selectman last year but had previously served on the Board of Selectmen.

With the withdrawal of Cook it was expected that Mr. Bowers will be the leading candidate for the position of chairman of the board.

Although no other persons have announced their intention of seeking the office of selectman, it was believed today that there will be a large field of candidates in the race.

With potential candidates for office, especially that of tax collector, which is expected to develop a free-for-all fight, holding out to see who else will run, political activity has been slow in warming up this year.

All candidates must be filed with the town clerk on or before next Monday.

Washington, Aug. 21.—(AP)—The Senate finance committee held the key today to the next development in the Connecticut patronage controversy as a result of the nomination of Robert Scherer to the internal revenue collector.

The administration's latest move to appoint Scherer to the job of collector in the two-year-old case appeared to be a defeat for failure of the Senate to act before adjournment.

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### TO RESUME TEACHING OF MUSIC IN SCHOOLS

#### G. Albert Pearson Named Instructor; Study Has Been Suspended for Past Three Years; Four Appointments Are Made.

Study of music in the public schools of Manchester will be resumed this fall after a lapse of three years, it was learned today from Superintendent of Schools Arthur H. Tilling, who also announced that G. Albert Pearson has been named as instructor of music in the seventh and eighth grades and the high school.

New Teachers  
In addition, Mr. Tilling announced four other appointments to the local teaching staff for the school year of 1935-36, which opens Wednesday, September 4, exactly two weeks from today. Miss Bertha M. Kurlberg of Painesville, Ohio, has been engaged as director of physical education for girls at Montpelier, Vermont, and has been named to teach fifth grade at the Manchester Central School. She replaces Miss Helen Norton, who was engaged last spring but resigned to accept a position at West Hartford.

Music was dropped as a regular study in the local schools in 1932, due to the acute necessity of paring the school budget to the limit. Miss E. Marion Downard taught the subject for several years prior to that time and upon her release, Mr. Pearson was engaged in a part time capacity to direct the five clubs at the high school. This was the only effort toward the continuation of music in the local schools, aside from that undertaken voluntarily by the teachers in the respective grades. Mr. Pearson has impressed upon his staff the importance of music in the lives of the children and when it was decided to return to the curriculum, he was recommended as the most logical person for the full time position. It was felt that music is of great importance to youth and should therefore be resumed at the earliest possible time.

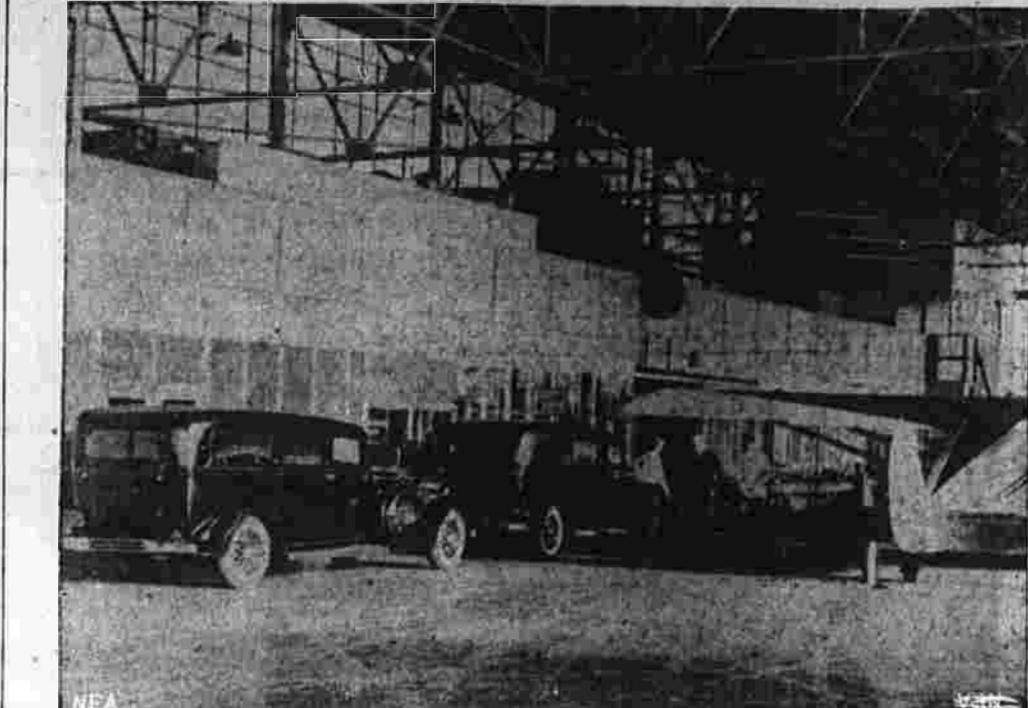

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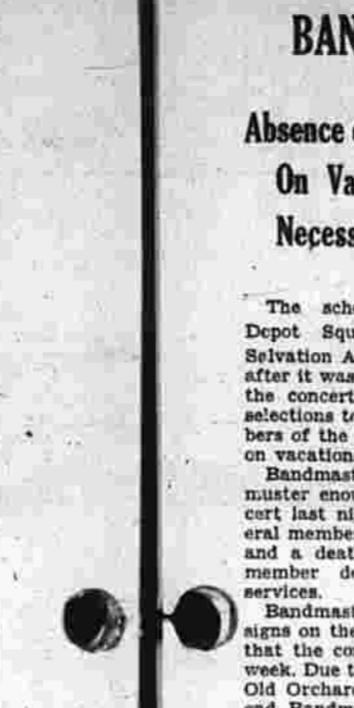
