Epidemics of infantile paralysis vary as well. The disease is much more dangerous to infants under one year of age, and persons over 15, than it is to children between these ages. Fortunately, the disease is very rare among infants.

About one-fourth of those who develop paralysed limbs recover all and several of her old friends called

About one-fourth of those who develop paralyzed limbs recover almost completely. The rest, about 75 per cent, are left with paralyzes of various types.

The worst cases occur in children under 10 years of age. Apparently the higher the fever during the acute lattack, the more likely is there to be permanent paralysis.

When the condition is discovered, it is customary nowadays to inject into the patient blood serum from the disease or that from a normal being.

It is also attempted, in some cases, to use the vaccines which have recently been made by macerating the spinal cords of monkeys after they had been inoculated with infantile paralysis.

Some physicians are convinced that the serum, if given very early in the disease, perhaps even before paralysis sets in, if of great value in preventing a physical defect. This method is still in an experimental stage, but in view of the great threat which infantile paralysis sotually is, most physicians are inclined to use the serum.

The completeness of recovery from paralysis depends also to a large extent on what is done.

In the first place, nothing should be done until the severe infection begins to subside. Then heat may be applied to the limbs, and there may be massage to benefit the action of the muscles.

Fortunately, orthopedic surgery has developed a considerably number of excellent operations. Transplantation of tendrous and muscles, and modifying joints make it possible for some who have been crippled to walk satisfactorily.
