

Sir John Tyndall the eminent British scientist of the last century states in his book on The Floating Matter in Air that "Dust is merely mater in the wrong place". How appropriate this maxim can be applied to the usual methods in the disposal of human wastes (sewage), factory wastes and garbage. The town's present method in the disposal of garbage is a relic of harbarism. While it is rather practical from an economic standpoint, it is unsanitary and must necessarily be from an economic standpoint, it is unsanitary and must necessarily be very obnoxious to those who happen to live in the vicinity of the Broad street dump. Some day let us hope that the present antiquated method of disposal will be replaced by a modern system, even if it costs a little more. Will now mention some facts on the disposal of human and factory wastes and the pollution of streams. A few years back a commission was appointed by the government to investigate these matters, with the idea of taking some definite action. But they seem at times to be in a sort of comatose condition. Possibly its not their enough teeth in them to entirely eradicate these evils. Many of the readers of the Herald can remember when salmon were caught in the Connecticut river. Shad as well as other fish are very susceptible to ab-sorbing odors of the streams in which they habitate. Those caught

The pollution of streams and rivers is not only a disgrace to civilization, but a menace. Large factories and all kinds of commercial industries have followed the lines of least resistance and are dumping enormous quantities of waste materials, this being the easiest and cheapest method of disposal. These wastes together with sewage finally get in our streams and rivers and thereby exterminate most of the fish and aquatic vegetation.

Many large industrial concerns have made an honest and sincere affort to filter out their waste materials before permitting it to reach the streams and rivers. These concerns are to be highly commended for their efforts. Chency Brothers were among the first to make a sincere effort to dispose of their factory wastes as well as human wastes. They have spent many thousands of dollars in experimental tests besides obtaining the advice of the best experts in this country, it may not be amiss to mention a few facts of the treatment and disposal of wastes from a silk mill. It is about as difficult a propositoins as you run up against when you consider that the wastes are composed largely by silk gum, soaps and various gums and products used in printing silk. These substances even in very dilute form have a tendency to clog up any kind of filter. The treatment of straight human wastes is no longer a problem and is a cinch compared to treatment of above mentioned wastes. Finally Chency Bros built and operated a disposal plant, which is now in active operation and owned by the Town of Manchester.



Eleven years ago on December 51, 1923, Connecticut had only 11.3 percent of her farms electrified, being one of the nine states which then had reached the ten-percent mark in rural exten-sions. 


