### ITALY AND ETHIOPIA: Story Of A Long-Brewing Conflict

No. 2



In February, 1917, four years after the death of Menellic II, the throne of Ethiopia fell to the joint occupancy of Ras Tafari (now Halle Sclassie) and his great aunt, Queen Zauditu, a daughter of Menellic. The victor of Adowa had designated his grandson, Lij Yassu, as his successor, but the latter intrigued with the dervishes of the Sudan, including the notorious "Mad Mullah," and was excommunicated by the national Coptic Christian church. The "rases," or feudal barons of the country, thereupon deposed him and established the dual rule. Lij Yassu took to the hills, vowing vengance.

Four years of tribal warfare followed the coronation of Tafari and Zauditu, ending with the capture of Lij Yassu. Tafari thereafter pur-Lij Yassu. Tafari thereafter pursued the policies of Menclik. He kept his country as the only territory in Africa that was neutral in the World war and on September 28, 1923, won admission to the League of Nations. This step was taken after he had decreed death to alaye traders and the gradual emancipation of the numerous serfs in his feudal land. The aim was to end slave raids across the border of neighboring Italian, French and British possessions,


On August 2, 1928 Italy and Ethiopia signed a treaty of "perpetual friendship." It provided for the arbitration of all disputes between the two countries and for the cession to the African monarchy of a free zone in the port of Assab, Eritrea, together with constructive of free, together with construction of a motor highway thence to Addis Ababa. This happy occasion was the outgrowth of an official visit the previous year to the Ethioplan capital by the Duke of the Abruzzi, a return for the state journey which Ras Tafari had made to Europe in 1924. But the pact's projects languished, each side blaming the other for delays.



Ras Tafari became Emperor Haile Schassle, "King of Kings of Ethiopia, Conquering Lion of Judah, Elect of God," on November 2, 1930, At the coronation were princes and special envoys from many foreign capitals. The ceremonics were staged seven months after the death of Queen Zauditu had left Tafari alone on the throne, Crowned with him was his wife, Waizaro Menen, a great-granddaughter of Menen, a great-granddaughter of Menelik II. Their children trace through both parents to Sahale Selassie who reigned 1795-1847 and generally is recognized in Ethiopia as a descendant of King Solomon and the Queen of Shebs.
