### Son of Former President Breaks Long Silence to Grant Interview—Tells of His Chosen Career.

New Haven, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Purchaser John Coolidge apparently having inherited his father's love for silence, makes a precedent today to talk about his favorite subject—being a "railroad man."

The son of former President Calvin Coolidge, in one of his rare public utterances, modestly told of his progress during the seven years, since Tuesday, he has devoted to the Choctawhatchee and the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad company.

He was enthusiastic as he spoke of "the low and enjoyable" nature of the work and blushed as officials of the road called him "a real railroad man who was liked by everybody connected with the company."

Not interested in politics, too, but it was easy to see that the tall, slender Amherst graduate and his son were elsewhere. The day prior to his 25th birthday, John Coolidge engaged in purchasing work for the railroad's various subsidiaries. His duties consist mainly of looking after the needs of the

road's several divisions and were described by officials as "being of a very responsible nature."

John Coolidge was born in Danbury, Conn., Sept. 10, 1890. He graduated from the University of Vermont in 1912, where he accepted a position as a junior clerk in the statistical department of the operating department. He married Florence LeMay, daughter of former Governor John W. Truman, Sept. 28, 1918. They have a daughter Cynthia. She will be two years old October 28.

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# STREET CAR, BUSES, BEST FOR CHILDREN

### Prevalence of Accidents Makes Bicycles, Skating, "Thumbing" Dangerous.

With Connecticut's record of traffic accidents far above that of the rest of the State opening for fall sessions, The Connecticut Company today called the attention of parents to the fact that street cars and motor buses are the safest means of transportation to and from classes for high school pupils and grammar school children who live at a considerable distance from the school which they must attend.

The child who is permitted to ride his own bicycle or to skate to school must necessarily be involved in traffic and be subject to its dangers. To the child who walks a long distance to school, the temptation to "thumb" an auto ride or to steal rides on the rear ends of trucks is always present.

Statistics have definitely proved that the street car is the safest public transportation in which to ride and even in case of accident a child is more likely to be injured or killed by a motor vehicle than in the automobile of a motorist who has taken him aboard in rear of his own car.

Parents should be particularly alert to the safety of school children when they are boarding or leaving school vehicles. The child who "hitch-hikes" to school is in special danger, since in order to thumb a ride he is invariably placed on the sidewalk or the traveled portion of the highway.
