Duties of Tax Collectors Are Made Known By Smith

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Tax collectors cannot be charged with a "shortage" for failure to collect interest charges on delinquent taxes. Nor have they discretionary power of compromise on taxes, interest and fees.

These are two of five rulings given by the State Tax Commissioner William H. Hackett by Joseph P. Smith, assistant attorney general, on questions concerning the duties of tax collectors.

The rulings are on questions as to the duty of the collector to separate certificates containing liens against each separate and distinct item of real estate as set forth in the tax list of the delinquent.

YORKSHIRE MINE BLAST KILLS 16

Bodies of Men Are Recovered from North Gawber Colliery in Barnsley.

Barnsley, Yorkshire, England, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The bodies of 16 miners, killed in an explosion, were recovered today from the North Gawber colliery.

Eight others, seriously burned, the men were trapped behind a wall of flame in a 200-yard gallery last night, were rescued to the hospital.

Donald Brook, one of the survivors, said "a cloud of choking coal dust lay down the workings and everything was blacked out."

REPORT INCREASE IN TOBACCO CROP

Total Production for Connecticut Valley Is Estimated at 21 Million Pounds.

Boston, Sept. 13.—(AP)—A 70-71,000 pound crop was predicted today by the U. S. Department of Agriculture as this year's total production of cigar type tobacco compared to 17,500,000 pounds last year. On all types except Miami variety, the report indicated, would be greater than in 1929.

During August prospects improved for Miami valley tobacco, however, cut broadleaf, Southern Wisconsin and Connecticut valley, however, were shaded down.

Total production for Connecticut valley was forecast at 21,000,000 pounds on September 1, the report said. A 2,800,000 pound crop of broadleaf tobacco was predicted for the Connecticut valley compared to last year's crop of 8,600,000.

September 1 conditions of Havana seed indicated 8,700,000 pounds last year compared to 8,475,000 pounds last year. Connecticut cut broadleaf was forecast a 6,152,000 pound harvest compared to 5,268,000 pounds last year.

Prospects for the Georgia-Florida shade grown crop were bright. August conditions indicated 2,800,000 pounds remained unchanged during August.

LEGISLATURE COST STATE \$453,252.40

Comptroller Releases Figures; Cost Over \$5,000 a Day to Run Assembly.

Hartford, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The cost of the 1930 session of the General Assembly was \$453,252.40, according to figures released today by the Comptroller of the State.

The total cost reported today was \$202,400 less than the \$655,652.40 for the 1929 session, or 31 percent less.

The report includes a list of 1,216 items which were purchased for the session, including stationery, printing, and other supplies.

The average cost per day for the session was \$5,000, with a maximum of \$10,000 on some days.

R. I. TEXTILE WORKERS THREATEN TO STRIKE

Walkout Recommended in Vote by Delegates Representing 17 Local Unions.

Providence, R. I., Sept. 13.—(AP)—A state-wide strike of members of the United Textile Workers of America appeared possible today. A walkout was recommended last night in a vote by delegates representing 17 local unions in the North Providence, North Smithfield and Olneyville trade councils.

The recommendation was referred to a meeting of the Rhode Island Textile Council Sunday. The council is composed of delegates from the 65 local unions in the state and has the power to recommend to local unions that a strike be called on a specified date. Each local must vote individually on a strike.

The walkout was proposed as a protest against the workers' charge that some manufacturers have refused to recognize the collective bargaining clause of the Wagner-Connelly bill.

A statement from the union after the meeting said a representative of the National Textile Labor Board would come to Rhode Island Monday to attempt to adjust the differences between manufacturers and workers.

Stockholders Called Into Meeting Next Wednesday To Take Action; Most Banks Oppose It.

Letters were sent out last night to stockholders of the Manchester Trust Company calling attention to a meeting scheduled for 4 o'clock in the afternoon of Wednesday, September 18, to vote on the question of continuing membership in the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation created under the Federal Banking Act of 1933.

Stockholders voted at a meeting held November 23, 1933, to adopt the temporary plan of deposit insurance offered under the Banking Act of 1933. This temporary insurance has now become permanent.

With the prospects of the department closing down completely within a short time and the winter coming on, it is becoming urgent that a situation in Manchester be cleared up.

There have been meetings in the past called to consider this question, but, according to the broad facts, there has not been the attendance and consideration from Hartford.

Officers of the Manchester Trust Company today declined to comment on the matter before the stockholders, but it is expected they will vote not to accept membership in the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

General conditions under which membership was accepted in the temporary deposit fund no longer exist.

There is a possibility that the Federal Deposit Insurance law may be found unconstitutional.

Indication that the constitutionality of the law will be tested was seen Wednesday when Hartford officers of the Manufacturers' Trust Company of New York brought suit for an order to restrain the bank from paying its assessment to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Many bankers have believed that FIDC was unconstitutional but have been hesitant to initiate the attack on the law.

Bankers particularly in the big cities have objected strenuously to the FIDC, although in the form of legislation it was far less objectionable to them.

It is believed that the big banks feel that while they pay assessments on the basis of total deposits, only the deposits up to \$5,000 are protected.

The larger banks have a large percentage of individual deposits above this figure.

Bankers in the smaller communities have smaller individual deposits and a larger percentage of deposits receive a greater proportionate measure of protection.

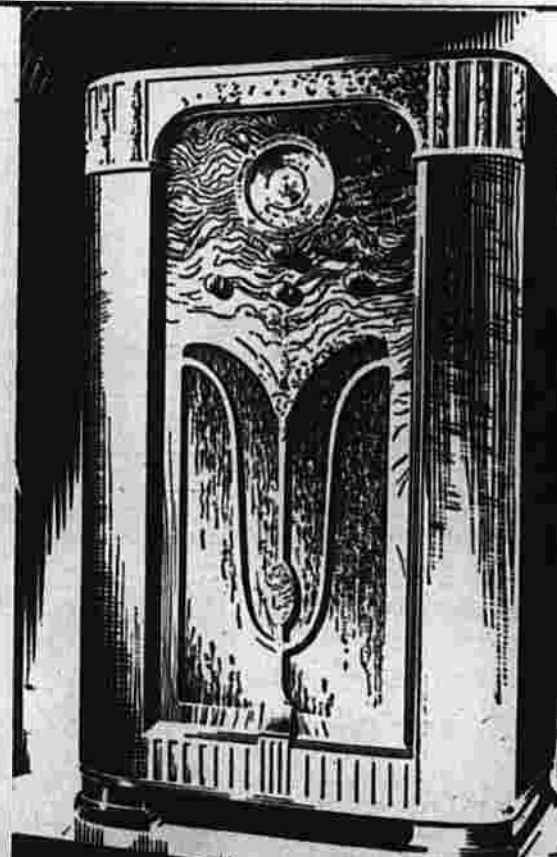

YOUR CHILDREN

Peter comes home with a broad grin and announces that he's in a new room. There aren't quite enough seats and three children have to sit on chairs.

"Then you'll never learn to spell," sighs his mother. And later she confides to Peter's father that it is time to close the school. This boy's case is typical of thousands of others, whether the difficult subject be spelling or arithmetic or French. So it seems to be a timely topic for discussion.

For the moment we shall overlook the fact that some schools are closed altogether for lack of funds, others are in arrears for salary payments, and still more have had to close several rooms and put the overload on the fraction of teachers left.

A Usual Average We will assume that money is no subject and that in this factory-land every teacher has 20 pupils, the figure one hears most usually quoted.

In the class grouped about teachers' wives are Annie and Mabel, neither of whom can get arithmetic. And Tommy and Dick, the school-children and Isaac who pinches the children, and Polly who won't learn.

There is about the same mental average as would occur in a class twice the size. Perhaps six are independent of any help and need little teaching at all.

The teacher helps the slow ones and explains and re-explains. But she cannot produce brain energy that isn't there, cannot search out the blind spots or supplies that lie at the root of poor spelling and bad reading.

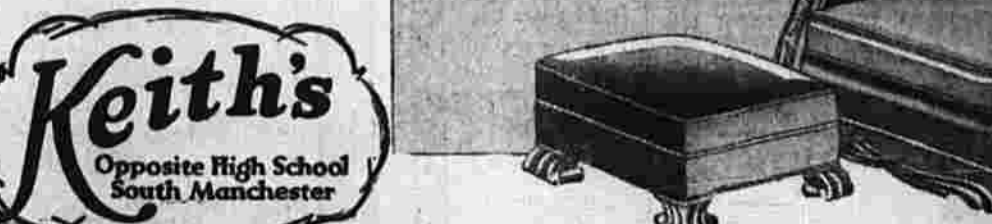

AUSTRALIA SCANS U.S. RELIEF PLANS

Premier 'Joe' Lyons Studies Our System Before Returning to Homeland.

Sydney (AP)—A scheme for national insurance, to be operated jointly by the federal and state governments of Australia, is being considered by Joseph A. Lyons, federal prime minister, who is back at work after his homeward journey from London via the United States.

The scheme would merge all government social services under control of a federal health council. Uniform rates for pensions, sickness compensation, child endowment and widows' pensions are proposed. In some respects the program resembles the American President-Elect Hoover's plan for a national insurance system.

NEW TAX BILL HITS BIG CORPORATIONS

Small Business Concerns May Get Reductions; To Net \$250,000,000.

Washington (AP)—From experts appraising the new federal tax system in the post-Congress calm, some fresh assurance for the average taxpayer that the "big fellow" and he alone, will pay the added

Small corporations not only will be assessed nothing extra, but the great majority of them probably will get reductions in the amount they are required to shell out, these experts say after careful examination of the big tax measure expected to bring in a total of \$240,000,000 to \$250,000,000.

Small Corporations Pay Less Under the old plan there was a flat rate of 13 1/2 per cent. This, a considerable fiscal weight has been lifted from every corporation with net earnings below \$10,000 — and these, under the latest available government figures, comprise more than seven-eighths of all corporations making payments of roughly \$50,000,000 of a total of \$200,000,000.

Lloyd George Wants League Refashioned

London (AP)—David Lloyd George, last survivor of the "Big Three" combination that forged the world's hope for a lasting intercorporate peace in the rubble of the League of Nations, is expected to announce that he would like to see the League of Nations refashioned.

Adapted from 45 years of fiery British politics at picking a wide variety of clubs with which to behave his enemies, the silver-haired Welshman, now engaged in an attempted comeback to his wartime glory, has chosen the League's disarmament and peace failure as an instrument to embarrass the present national conservative government.

Speaking allegorically of the League as a sword, he says the conservatives "have blunted and notched and cracked until it is almost worthless."

"Unfortunately," he told a labor group here recently, "there is only one thing to do, and that is to put it back in the furnace and recast it. The conservatives have completely destroyed its power."

Contenting that the League is "in the ditch" and that he has seen the world affairs that have seen the League reformed, Lloyd George, who sat in the Hall of Mirrors when the League was founded, blames his enemies for its present impotence.

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ETHIOPIA KNOWS NO CONQUERORS

Ethiopia, with "one foot in the Middle Ages and the other in the League of Nations," presents a vivid contrast to the rest of Africa. Elsewhere on the Dark Continent the white man is respected as conqueror and modernizer; in the land of Emperor Haile Selassie the white man is neither conqueror nor modernizer, for he has been defeated there.

The Ethiopians have lived surrounded by enemies. They have seen a combination of great European powers take their parts and their countries away, and have been out off in this and other ways from the west and north. "It is a fact that their ships which centuries ago
