TO CHECK CLOSELY ON GAS STORAGE

Dealers Who Lead Up In Order to Beat New Tax Will Be Prosecuted.

Distributors and retailers of gasoline who attempt to load their storage facilities in anticipation of the increase in gasoline taxes effective October 1, will run afoul of the law and suffer the revocation of their licenses, it was announced today by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, Colonel Michael A. Connor.

The last General Assembly increased the gasoline tax from two to three cents. It is estimated that the increase tax will yield approximately two million dollars in additional revenue.

The Commissioner stated, anticipates an additional record of receipts and sales for the month of September, together with inventory at the close of the month.

These reports, now in the hands of individual gasoline dealers, will be filed, under oath, with the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, not later than October 5. The amount of gallons on hand as of October 1 will be certified to the State Treasurer and the additional one cent tax charged to the respective licensees.

Commissioner Connor stated, that if any dealer is found to have misused a license, or to have failed to discover any attempt at evasion of the license of individuals or corporations, the license will be revoked forthwith until such time as an official report is submitted.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Fred Betlach, 25, scanned today the year he spent mostly in a respirator because of infantile paralysis, and said "hahaha." He is playing football next fall.

He was sitting in a wheel chair near the "iron lung" which has been his home every night, and much of every day since it was installed September 25, 1934. A healthy grin corroborated his words.

His right arm is shrunk and he weighs only 60 pounds, but he thinks there are other persons much worse off than he is. He now spends 10 hours a day outside the "lung."

GAS METERS ARE FOUND ACCURATE IN CONN. TESTS

Gas meters used by Connecticut public utility companies have been found to be exceptionally accurate in practically all tests conducted by the Public Utilities Commission.

Whenever disputes over meter accuracy have occurred between consumers and the gas companies, such disputes are carried to the commission only a very few times each year, since the individual companies are always willing to conduct tests of measuring accuracy for any customer who believes his meter is not functioning correctly.

When customers have requested the commission to make tests, they have been conducted by fully equipped university laboratories, and, in nearly all cases when meters have been discovered to be not quite accurate, it has also been found that most of the meters were "slow" instead of "fast," an average of 25 per cent in the complaint.
