The League of Nations stands higher in the respect of the people of the world today than it has for many years. Yesterday it functioned as in its conception it was intended to function, by having notice on Italy and Ethiopia that neither party to their controversy is to be aggressive military action before December 4—constructive data for the expiration of three months ago—without assuming an attitude of war against every other member of the League.

The presumption is, of course, that Benito Mussolini will ignore the implicit threat contained in this action; that Italy will withdraw from the League and proceed to invade Ethiopia as he has planned.

There would seem to be scarcely more than the millionth chance that Italy will adopt any other course. But it is probable that he will go ahead with his war on any basis of expediency that he will actually have to fight the whole League. Of course, however, in mind the fact that once before the League actually did stand by him, and that in practically the same lengths in this case—then it was developed on his Manchurian enterprise and when the League's protest, despite turned out to have been a bluff that never was to be made good.

The cases, however, are not exactly similar. There would seem to be a much greater chance that the League leaders will go to any lengths in order to prevent Italy's planned aggression in Ethiopia than there was that they would take any action in the case of Japan. To put the situation on an entirely realistic basis, they have far more states in the present situation. It is not that they are so much more collector of the rights of Ethiopia than they are in the past.
