Dr. Charles T. LaMoure, superintendent of the State Training School 444 at Manafield, gave a highly interesting talk on Connecticut's care of its mental defectives at the regular moonday meeting of the Kiwanis Club at the Country Club today. Dr. LaMoure has been at the achool since it came into existence eighteen years ago and prior to that was at the Lakeville institution.

The speaker said that the state turned its attention to the care of mentally deficient persons within its borders as far hack as 1856, when there were 1,200 imbeciles in Connecticut. In 1915, the state legislature appropriated \$200,000 for this work and two years later the school at Manafield was begun. It now has Mansfield was begun. It now has 1,280 inmates, all housed in modern, fireproof buildings and all being taught useful subjects and trades.

He said that the school has a large waiting list and expressed the
