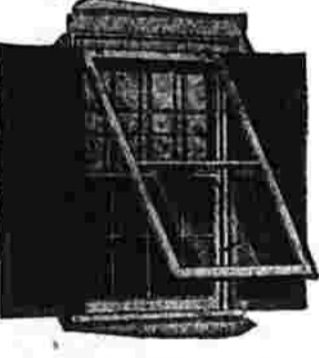

ROTATION OF CROPS HELPS ARIZONA ENHANCE YIELD

Winslow, Ariz.—(AP)—Important results of crop rotation in raising of ensilage have been obtained by two northern Arizona farmers. C. A. LaPrade of Winslow reports 18 tons of silage per acre have been raised on his farm from corn on alfalfa land as compared with 11 tons from corn on land cropped to corn three years in succession.

N. D. Karchner of Linden has found that corn in rotation with beans yielded 12 tons of silage per acre compared with nine tons from corn following corn under dry farming conditions this season.

The recent discovery of oil on their property enabled the Bennetts to pay off all obligations on their 3,500-acre ranch through the sale of mineral rights for \$22,000. The ranch, located in Yoakum county, had been advertised for sale by mortgage holders.

"So I am to preach for seven Sundays, and the Gulf Company is to take all the money during that time to the Red Cross and the other hat to the Salvation Army. Both to be used for unemployment relief."

"So I got nothing to lose in the transaction but my voice, and I never lost it yet. The only one I can see who is the Gulf Company, that is if they don't sell enough gas to pay for the gas they bought from me. So soon as I get through they'll give you a check. Don't thank me, thank the Gulf Company or better still, thank the listeners. They will be the sufferers. Yours, Will Rogers."

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

By ROONEY DUTCHER

Washington, Nov. 13.—With Huey Long out of the picture, President Roosevelt and his political advisers are more or less worried about Father Coughlin, Dr. Townsend, and Gov. Eugene Talmadge of Georgia in the order named.

The administration would hate to have Coughlin fulminating against it in the election campaign. On the other hand, it can't afford to fight along with the radio priest's economic and monetary proposals.

Although Coughlin couldn't practically support a conservative Republican and he isn't believed likely to go for a third party, he is regarded as unpredictable and hence something to worry about.

The Townsendites are considered more of a menace to certain Democratic members of Congress in the west than a threat to the nation's ticket. But the administration will be careful not to step on Dr. Townsend's toes at the next session, even though it regards his old age pension plan as cockeyed.

No Furore Over Talmadge
The Democratic high command observe with pleasure that Governor Talmadge, though he has been around the country a bit, isn't picking up any noteworthy support as a presidential candidate.

It is said that the governor might like Roosevelt in the Georgia primary, which would look simply awful, because the President has always claimed Georgia as his "second home" and has been known to be tremendously popular there.

Talmadge's plans have been uncertain, but administrationists hope the mammoth "homecoming" celebration for Roosevelt in Georgia will persuade him there's no nourishment in trying to get the Georgia delegation.

The party politicians think they could lick Talmadge in the Georgia primary. But they're not quite sure.

Recruitment clings to the idea that Gov. All Landon of Kansas will be his political opponent next fall. His advisers, in general, aren't so convinced. But they're studying up on Landon just the same.

Canary Seed New Worry
Will the AAA put a processing tax on canary seed?

Don't laugh. That's one of those difficult problems now pestering some of the farm administration's master minds.

Amendments to the AAA act passed by the last Congress added grain sorghum to the grain commodities and require Secretary Wallace to formulate a program for it, since its price is far from parity.

Plenty of grain sorghum is used on farms. But officials find that its only commercial use is in manufacture of canary seed. So—!

Life's Oil On Figs
Naturally, there's much more concern over the corn-hog program.

AAA now plans to increase this year's low production of pigs by 20 per cent, which ought to mean lower pork prices by election time.

That's about as many pigs as can be produced and means 60,000,000 pigs as compared to a normal low-year has period average pigpage of 81,000,000.

The drought cut many pig-raisers down to from 30 to 40 per cent of their individual base, while others were able to raise 300 per cent.

The idea for remedying this is to give the benefit payments, or the bulk of them, to the low percentage fellows and let them raise all the hogs they possibly can, with the hindered pig owners and others near their class are limited to their 300 per cent of the five-year base average.

The trouble with the scheme, designed to avert a permanent shift in the pig population, is that it's likely not to produce 60,000,000 pigs.

For months the Italian army in Eritrea prepared for the day when it would capture Adigrat, first objective in the great Adwa offensive. What must the Italian soldiers have thought when they gazed on this scene and realized that they had attained the long-cherished goal? ANSCHESS' RULES FOR GERMANS AND AUSTRIANS ABROAD

Vienna (AP)—Tension along the Austro-German border continues to worry statesmen, and Vienna newspapers will print stories about the aggressive plans of the "Austrian Legion" of Nazi fugitives from Austria who found refuge in Germany.

But, in faraway lands the interests of Austrian citizens frequently are looked after by German consulates and legations.

If any Austrian citizen should get into trouble in Ethiopia, for instance, he would go for advice to the German legation in Addis Ababa. For the German legation represents Austrian interests there.

In Manchukuo, too, according to the official Austrian Yearbook just published, the Vienna government has confided the protection of Austrian citizens to the German consulates in Harbin and Mukden.

Likewise in the Straits Settlements and in British Borneo the German consulate general in Singapore for protection. If he finds himself embarrassed in Nicaragua there are four German consulates to which he can appeal at Managua, Bluefields, Leon and Matagalpa.

In Siam, the German legation in Bangkok is entrusted with the protection of Austrian citizens, and in Venezuela it is the German consulates at Caracas, Ciudad Bolivar, La Guayra, Puerto Cabello and Valencia.

POLITICIANS SEE NEAT STRATEGY IN AAA MOVE

Washington—Political leaders sense a neat bit of strategy in the move of AAA officials offering four-year production contracts to farmers before the supreme court rules on the legality of the processing tax.

Refusal of the court to hear arguments on the Hoosier Mills case until December 9 makes it highly improbable that a decision will be had on the present method of collecting processing taxes until in January, 1936, at the earliest.

Hoosier four-year contracts, subject to certain rights of termination, are being offered wheat and rye farmers. Tobacco farmers have been or will be offered similar contracts. Late proposals will be submitted to cotton and corn-bog farmers under present plans.

In all, AAA officials would like to see some 3,000,000 individual farmers sign on the dotted line as quickly as possible, agreeing to gauge their production of various crops to the control program.

A powerful weapon.

The reason, say those on the inside, is that AAA officials figure hand they will have a powerful weapon with which to deal with Congress in the event the supreme court decides the processing taxes are unconstitutional.

The administration has insisted all along that should the court rule against the government in the Hoosier Mills case, Congress would have to find new taxes to replace the commitments already made by the government in the cotton, corn-bog, wheat, rye, tobacco, peanut, and sugar farmers.

The huge favorable majority rolled up by corn-bog farmers for extension of contracts has encouraged

AAA officials to push forward with their plans.

Budget Preparations.

Refusal of the supreme court to grant the request of the government for hearing arguments on the Hoosier Mills case on November 20 promises to make the job of preparing the budget for the coming fiscal year one of considerable doubt and uncertainty.

It is customary for the president to submit his budget message to Congress immediately after he delivers his message on the state of the union. In all probability, this budget message will be in the hands of Congress before the supreme court acts on the processing taxes.

President Roosevelt, in declaring that he was relying on the continuation of the processing taxes, estimated there would be a \$670,000,000 increase in revenues during the current fiscal year. An adverse ruling by the court not only would upset his prediction, but necessitate drastic revisions in the budget itself.

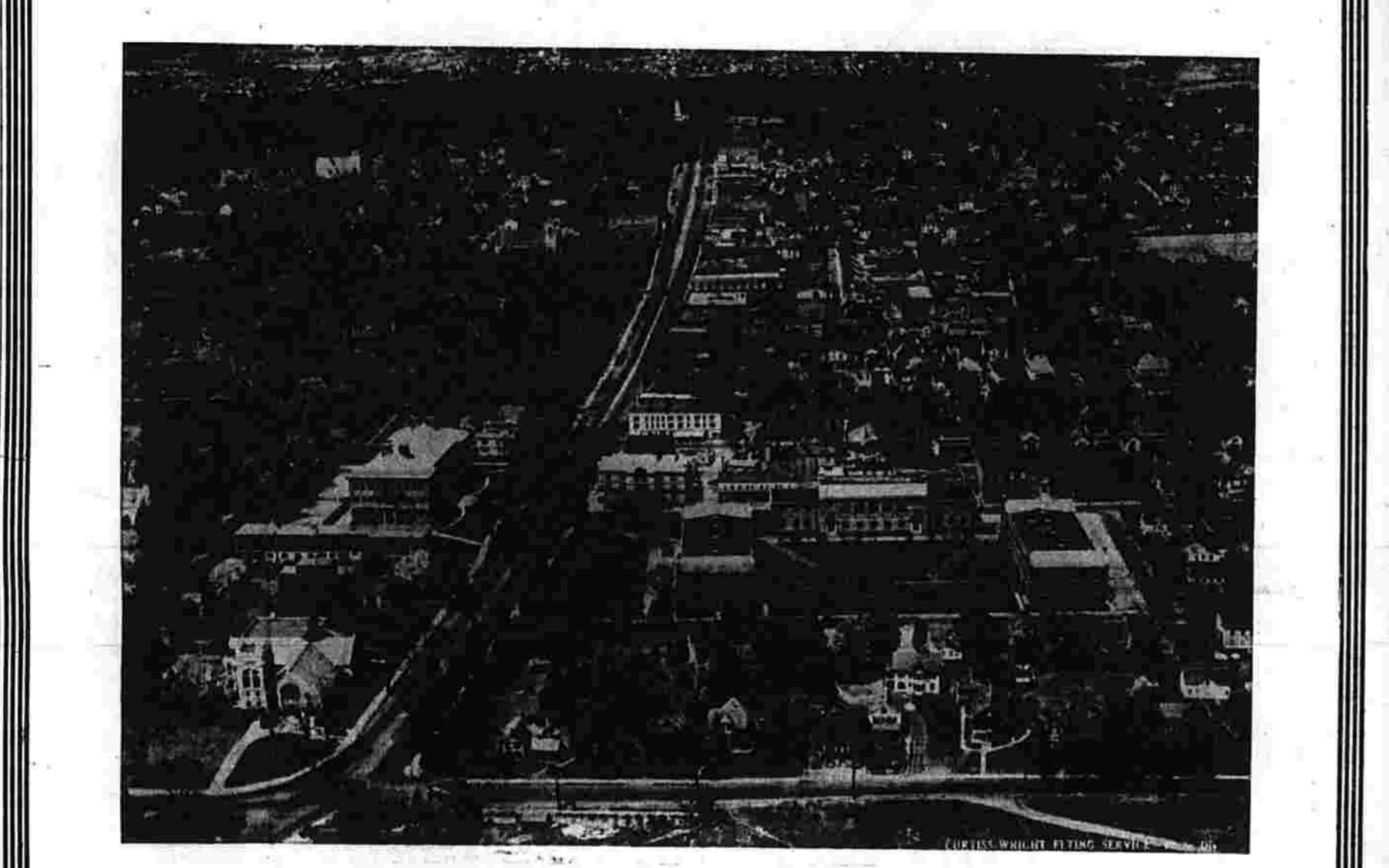



W. H. HAMILTON IS 'MYSTERY MAN' IN WASHINGTON

Washington (AP)—Dr. Walton H. Hamilton, the President's adviser on consumer problems, is Washington's new "mystery man."

He has been a special presidential adviser since June 30, but only since the arrival on Washington desks of a pamphlet called "The Consumer."

Commentators examine two facts and wonder: the rising cost of living, and the direct entry to the White House of a man of Hamilton whose particular worry is the rising cost of living.

Staff Gathers Facts. His program includes these objectives: inquiries into price "trouble spots" keep the product out of the consumer's reach; education of the public to use quality standards and to ask for grade labeling; advice to people buying co-operatively; and expansion of consumer's councils.

For some time Hamilton's staff of six economists has been gathering facts about key industries, women's dresses, shoes, tires, autos, ice and paper. When the surveys are done the facts will be made available to manufacturers and the people who buy from them.

Hamilton believes in making facts public. He wonders, for instance, how many men who start factories to make women's dresses know the average life of such a plant is only three years.

He grins over the industry dodging along with machines which are 30 years old on the average. He thinks they could sell more at lower prices if they had kept up-to-date.

"Just An Adviser." But, he points out, he has no power to fix and say, "You're gathering moos. Junk it." He is just an adviser. But he believes in advice.

"NRA, goodness knows made enough mistakes," he says, "but it did make business men think in larger terms, about whole industries instead of single plants."

He grins at the cynical suggestion that facts may not force the inefficient manufacturer to change his routine.

"You'd be surprised how many business men are intellectually curious enough to give us help," he says. "I've seen two of the largest organizations in the country offer us the free use of their books. We will study one set to find out the wage-earner's credit and how to use it."

So He Builds Boats. Hamilton can't remember when he started being an economist, but he has studied the subject in four colleges, and taught it in six. He is on leave from Yale university now, and the small of autumn on the air makes him a little homesick for New Haven where his wife still maintains their home.

The Hamiltons have three children, but it's Edward they are curious about. He turned up his nose at the suggestion of college, and all this in the face of his father's degree. Edward wants to build boats, so he's building boats. Presidential adviser Hamilton says there was nothing he could do about it, and that the boy may be right.

WIFE'S PARACHUTE SILKS. JAIL FRENCH CORPORAL. Paris (AP)—Jean Cogne was sentenced to two years in jail for dressing his wife in parachute silk.

Cogne, a private in the air corps, was convicted by court martial of having stolen parachute silk from the Villacoublay air base to make silks for his wife. He pleaded it was impossible to clothe Mme. Cogne on his salary of one and a half cents a day.

A full military court of gold-trimmed generals, their laps piled high with exhibits from Mme. Cogne's wardrobe, ruled it "better to go naked than steal from the state."

BRITAIN'S FLEET MAY USE PETROL MADE FROM COAL. London (AP)—Britain's fleet soon may be burning petrol made from coal. Auto owners already have bought it, unknowingly, in a mixture with a well known fuel.

A \$15,000,000 plant in northeast England, for the making of oils by hydrogenation of coal, has been placed in full operation.

Two thousand men will be directly employed in the expected annual production of 4,000,000 gallons.

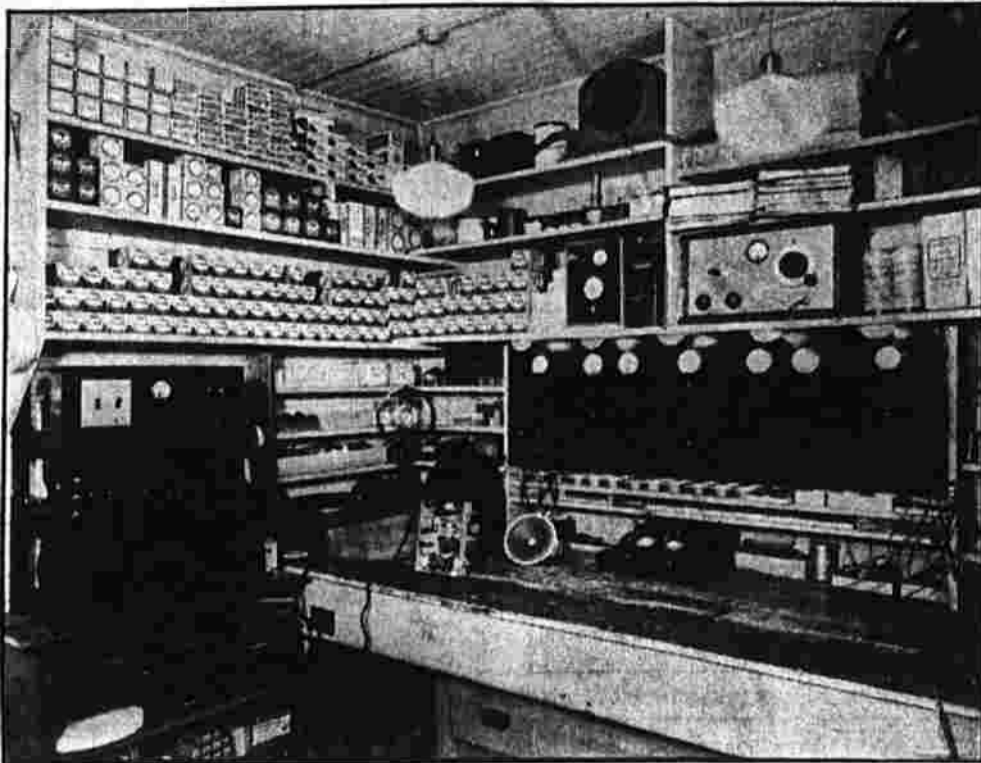
Two hours after a lump of coal enters the labyrinth of machinery and tubes it has been transformed into fine oil ready for use. Government officials look to this new process to help rejuvenate the stagnant coal areas of the northeast country.

GIBBON, 'TRIFLE' WRITER. OWNED BARE 1497 BIBLE. New York (AP)—A rare Latin version of the Bible, printed in 1497 and once owned by Edward Gibbon, author of "The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire," has been imported from England by Edwin Rumball-Petre, who deals exclusively in old Bibles.

It contains Gibbon's bookplate and crest, and some of the pages have been annotated.

The book, a small folio, is of particular interest, Rumball-Petre says, because Gibbon was reputed to be an infidel.

BOOK REVIEW BY BRUCE CATTON. The popularity of the murder stories of Eric Stanley Gardner is probably a significant indication of the American attitude toward the criminal courts.

Mr. Gardner's personal hero is Perry Mason, a hard-boiled lawyer who skates up to and over the edge of the law in his efforts to keep his clients from the gallows. Usually his clients are innocent; now and then they turn out to be guilty, but Perry Mason always sees to it that they get off, even if he has to break the law to do it, and he always leaves the reader satisfied.

Anyway, Mr. Gardner has written a new one—"The Case of the Caper-taker's Cat" (Morrow; \$2)—and it is a honey. This time Perry Mason is retained by the old caretaker of a rich man's house on a matter of minor importance, and finds himself

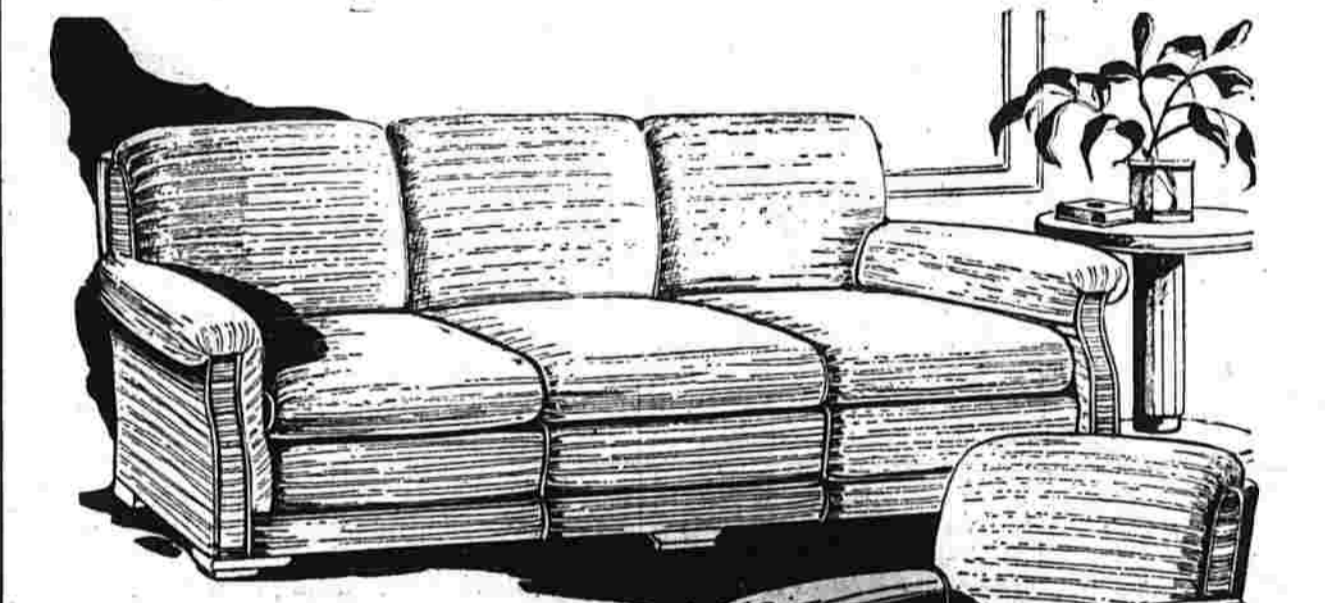

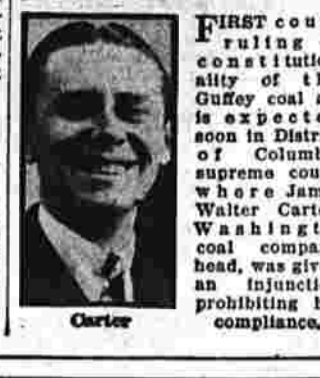

But since the depression that argument has faded. Today people without opportunity are looking to the settlements to show them how to enjoy their enforced leisure and make of it what they will.

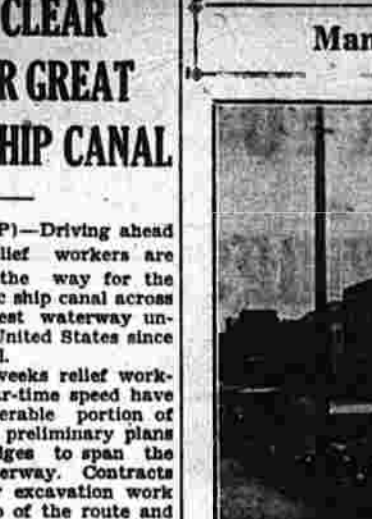
