BANK PLAN REDUCES BUDGET BY \$100,000
By Re-Financing Part of Town's Indebtedness It Would Be Possible to Effect 2.7 Mills Cut in Tax Rate—Boston Man Submits Proposal.

A plan by which the amount of money to be raised from property taxation this year and the next two years can be reduced by \$100,000 each year, was proposed in a letter received Saturday by the Finance sub-committee of the Board of Finance. The plan was submitted by W. W. Agnew, manager of the municipal department of the First National Bank of Boston for alleviating the tax burden this year and the next two years. If adopted by the town will reduce the annual appropriation for bond interest from \$100,000 next year and \$90,000 the year after next.

All probability will be in use after or twenty years from now.

"For this reason it is my recommendation that you issue temporary bonds to the extent of \$100,000, with the intention of applying to the legislature for permission to issue refunding bonds maturing for the next twenty years to a like amount. At the same time I think it would be well to have permission to issue \$100,000 refunding bonds in the same manner, in each of the two following years.

"In the event that the Legislature would not give you permission to issue the refunding bonds, you could all back up surplus of unexpended taxes to take care of the deficit. If they do you permit, a percentage of the surplus could also go to lower your tax rate."

Mr. Strongest recommendation to you, however, is to have a charter amended to establish a Board of Finance of three members. Your present act-up is somewhat unwieldy and while I feel, nevertheless, commendable manner I feel, never, if you have a Board of Finance, your finances could do a much better job than that of Board of Selectmen which has so many other matters.
