HERE IS THE BACKGROUND OF CHINA-JAP TROUBLE

Writer Explains That Japanese Eventually Wish to Dominate the Trade of its Neighboring Country.

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of two stories explaining the events leading up to the present Sino-Japanese situation and describing the present status of the controversy.

New York, Nov. 20.—(AP)—The apparently imminent remodeling of the map of China suggests that Japan means exactly what it is announcing its "hands-off Asia" policy.

North China—Five big provinces with 50,000,000 inhabitants—appears to be well on its way to becoming an independent state.

That is what happened to Manchuria in 1931. The Japanese became Manchukuo and acquired an Emperor, although it never has received recognition by most of the world.

This fact has in no way injured Japanese trade with the Manchurian, who, under the direction of their Japanese advisers, have installed trade regulations which in many cases virtually prohibit competition by other nations.

There have been verbal indications that the Japanese in the case of North China, do not intend to move an army there—yet they will which once guarded China from invaders.

At the same time, the Japanese have massed thousands of troops in Manchuria.

4 SIMPLE WAYS TO AVOID COLDS

Rules for Averting Infection and Subsequent Disorders Listed by Health Dept.

Four simple ways to avoid catching colds and thereby to avoid the subsequent danger of pneumonia were given by the State Department of Health in its regular bulletin in this week. These were as follows:

1. Keeping one's resistance high by avoiding overexertion, getting a fair share of rest, and watching the balance of foods so that fruits and vegetables, especially the green and yellow ones, and eggs, milk and butter, are not crowded out by too much starchy food.

2. Keeping the temperature of the home and office not over 70 degrees, and not too lightly dressed.

3. Dressing sensibly—not bunched up too much, nor too lightly dressed, and taking advantage of protective rubbers or overcoats when rainy, snowy or stormy weather prevails.

4. Keeping away from those who have colds, and avoiding public places where the air is full of germs.

Because of the danger of influenza and pneumonia, a cold, once it has been taken lightly, the bulletin warned, is a serious matter.

One factor which has much to do with the prevalence of colds is the season of the year, the bulletin said.
