INSURANCE SALES
ARE ON INCREASE

Over 100 Millions Now Have Policies in United States and Canada.

New York, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Growth of insurance sales in the United States and Canada was described today in addresses prepared for delivery before the 20th annual convention of the Association of Life Insurance Presidents. The number of individuals in the United States and Canada protected by life insurance was estimated by Henry S. Nollen, president of the Equitable Life Insurance Company of Iowa, at 100,000,000. He said disbursements by United States life insurance companies to policy holders and beneficiaries this year will approximate \$2,000,000,000. Of this sum, he said, \$1,700,000,000 was being paid to beneficiaries of deceased policy holders. Life insurance protection purchased by Americans from United States legal reserve companies in 1935 will approximate \$1,500,000,000, he said, commenting that this is 1.5 per cent more than in 1934. Williams A. Collins, president of the Wash. president of the National Convention of Insurance Commissioners, told the meeting of the 17th annual meeting of the States has more than twice as much life insurance as any other part of the world, although it has only 9 per cent of the earth's population. Urging the "maintenance of the full protection which has been accorded to the interests of the creditor," Arthur M. Golman, president of the Mutual Life Insurance Company, Hartford, Conn., pointed out \$4,000,000 policy loans and the beneficiaries in this country are concerned with insurance company investments.
