### GOVERNMENT TO REDUCE FUNDS FOR THE SCHOOLS

#### President Tells Educators They Should Not Expect Too Much; Relief Bill Problem.

Washington, Dec. 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today told state school officials that they should not expect too much in the way of Federal assistance because he is trying to reduce the government's budget as much as possible.

He added, in an informal talk to the 20 state superintendents who met here today, that education has been more successful than anything else from the depression and that bringing it back is a hard fight.

Mr. Roosevelt expressed hope for better pay for teachers and for agreement among the state officials on a more permanent National education policy. Cooperation of the Federal Government, he said, is essential.

### Found Studying For New Career

#### Government Officials and SEC Members Ask That the Bill Be Quashed.

Philadelphia, Dec. 11.—(AP)—The Securities Exchange Commission and other defendants in the United Gas Improvement Company's suit challenging the Constitutionality of the Public Utility Holding Company Act today asked the Federal District Court to quash the bill.

The defendants, who include Attorney General Homer S. Cummings, Postmaster General James A. Farley, U. S. Attorney Charles E. Smith, and others, argued that the bill is unconstitutional because it does not state a cause of action within the equitable jurisdiction of the court.

**BILL BANKHEAD  
DUE BACK FOR  
NEXT CONGRESS**

Washington—Prospects for a short and snappy session of the Congress which begins on Friday, January 3, are brightened by the fact that Bill Bankhead of Alabama will take over for the first time since he was chosen, the duties of majority floor leader of the House of Representatives at the beginning of the last session. Bankhead had no chance to demonstrate his ability to boss the legislative show in the House except by remote control. Representative Taylor of Colorado was acting floor leader during the entire session.

The presence of the soft-voiced genial southerner at the big red table in the center of the Democratic side of the House chamber will strengthen materially the majority leadership. Personally one of the most popular men in the House among all factions, an astute parliamentarian, and one of the real leaders in Congress, Bankhead long has been one of the mainstays of his party in Congress.

Leader Needed  
The Democrats will be greatly in need of a man of Bankhead's type in the coming session. The Republicans, sensing that the Roosevelt administration is not enjoying the happy days it once did, have taken courage and will be every opportunity to attack in the House.

It will be up to Bankhead to meet such onslaughts and fire back with everything he has. He has proven in the past that he can hold his own with any of them.

Even-tempered and amiable, the Alabama man aroused can be as "rough" as the best of them. Bankhead entered the House while his father was a member of the Senate. He often recalls that the first advice his father gave him was to ground himself thoroughly in the rules. He did so and served as chairman of the powerful rules committee before he was made floor leader.

That position requires a man to be hard and ruthless at times and Bankhead was no exception.

The "Big Rule"  
It still is remembered on Capitol Hill how he was called upon to get "new deal" legislation moving again in the first Roosevelt Congress when the going was rough.

Toward the last of the 73rd Congress, the Republicans deliberately sabotaged the legislative machinery with a filibuster. Bankhead, by one of the tripartite which ruled the House at the time, was elected to break the jam.

He quietly retired to his rules committee room and brought forth the famous "big rule" which he presented to the House for adoption. He attained a high point in drama by declaring:

"The people elected the Democrats to run the country, and I think it's time the Democrats look sharp."

In one spontaneous move the Democratic side of the House rose and sent up a great shout. The rule passed overwhelmingly.

There'll be more drama in the coming session of the House with Bankhead at the controls. The father of "Tullulah" is a great actor himself.

SHOCKED GANDHI**

Nasik, India (AP)—Symbolizing their decision to leave the Hindu fold, a large gathering of youths from the depressed classes publicly burned sacred Hindu books here. Including a copy of the laws of Manu, the ancient Hindu law-giver, and other upholding the doctrine of untouchability, the books were thrown on a pyre to the accompaniment of "tumultuous" and with dramatic solemnity.

Resolutions were passed that untouchables should neither visit holy places nor give money to Hindu priests.

A sensation was caused recently when Dr. Ambedkar, their leader, exhorted a mass meeting of the depressed classes to abandon Hinduism and adopt "any other religion which gives you equality of status and treatment." He said he had decided to change his religion.

When informed of Doctor Ambedkar's speech, Mahatma Gandhi said it seemed unbelievable, but if true it was an unfortunate event, especially when untouchability was on its last legs. He said a change of faith would not serve the untouchable cause.

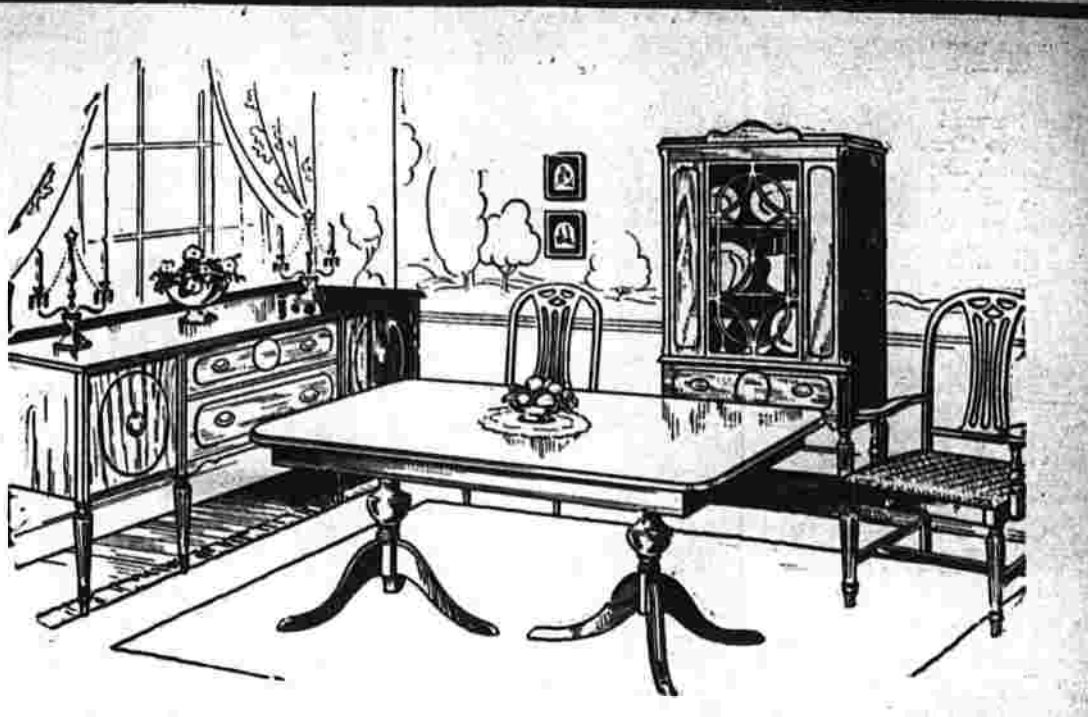

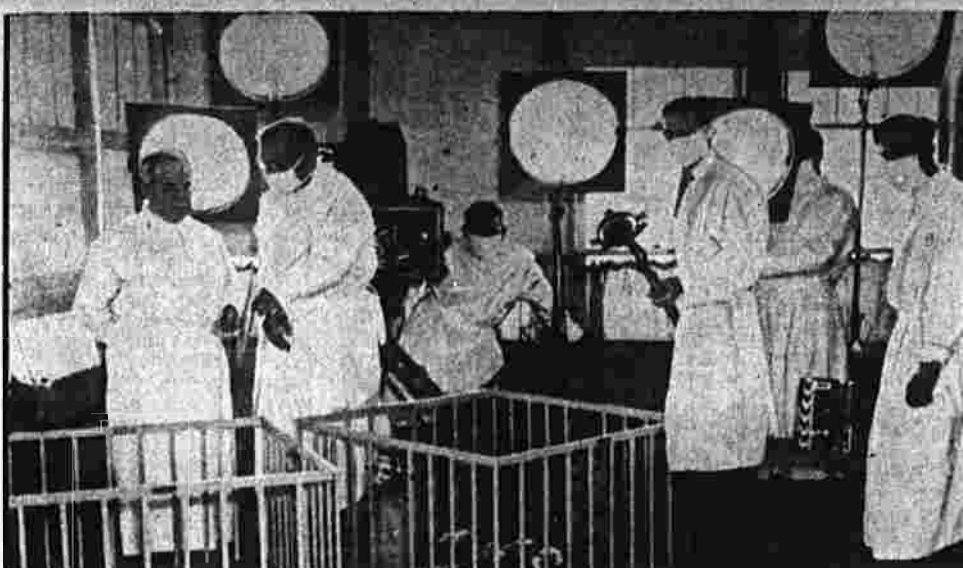
Back to the girls again; there are sewing layouts, patterns and all that are as complete as the work room of the professional seamstress.

### 'FRONT WHEELERS' GAVE MARK TWAIN MANY A TUMBLE

Detroit, Dec.—Clara Clemens, a Grandfather's daughter, Mark Twain, remembers her father as a pictureque, spirit-stirring man with all the rich, human characteristics of the fiction that carried him to fame.

"He had great love for the pictureque, and unconsciously supplied that element wherever he went, either in appearance or in unexpected thoughts expressed in striking language," says Mrs. Gabrieltowitch.

### Attended Wedding

She speaks of her father's "electric" presence at her wedding to Oastp Gabrieltowitch, the famous pianist, in 1909.

"The bridegroom and I felt more less conspicuous, but we hadn't have, because father was there—and he wore his scarlet Oxford gown at my request. In addition to his appearance, his dynamic personality was highly expressive even as a silent witness. It was almost laughable in the way that fire seems tangible."

### Mark Twain died the year after the wedding.

Mrs. Gabrieltowitch recalls that at the time those lofty bicycles were being used, one could see Mark Twain mounted on top of a huge wheel with an anxious expression on his face and curls waving in the breeze, while he vainly tried to guide the clumsy vehicle in the direction it should go. Many a fall he philosophically endured as an essential part of the experience. Yet in spite of heroic determination, father never mastered that sport.

### Clara Clemens traveled all over the world with her father.

Both sisters died many years ago and Clara Clemens Gabrieltowitch and her daughter, Nina, who graduated from Barnard college last year, are the only living descendants of Mark Twain.

Mrs. Gabrieltowitch says she believes "John of Arc" was her father's favorite among his own writings.

"I believe 'John of Arc' was his favorite partly because that subject interested him more than any other, and partly because the poetic, romantic side of his nature was better satisfied when writing about a figure of Joan's qualities and experiences."

### Mrs. Gabrieltowitch, as a singer, has appeared frequently on concerts with her husband.

She is an author, lecturer and actress. Last year she played the lead in the Drury Lane Players' Detroit production of "The Sign of the Cross" and with the Bonstelle company. Perhaps her greatest success was in the title role in George Bernard Shaw's "St. Joan of Arc."

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TEXAS MAY GET NATIONAL PARK ON RIO GRANDE

Fort Davis, Tex.—(AP)—Deep in America's last frontier—the Big Bend country of West Texas—15,000,000 acres of rugged beauty presently destined for a national park.

Across the Rio Grande at the southernmost part of the great bend in the stream, Mexico is planning a 1,000,000-acre park to make it an international show spot.

State and national park leaders recently made preliminary outlines of the desired scenic area on the Texas side. In the party of nine that spent five days in the Big Bend were Col. Conrad L. Wirth, assistant director of the national park service, and D. E. Colp, chairman of the Texas state park board.

Towering about 100 feet above the level of the Rio Grande is the tentative selection of land taken in not only the Chisos range with its beautiful canyons, but also the famous Mariscal canyon and Santa Helena canyon, the "grand canyon" of the Rio Grande.

Authorized by Congress in 1908, the area has a wide diversity of bird life. Its vegetation includes the red and green mesquite, a dozen kinds of oaks, the southernmost aspens in America, junipers, pines, pinyon and cholla.

Congress has passed a resolution authorizing the national park service to accept this area as a national park when it can be turned over to them in fee simple.

To be able to give title, the state of Texas will have to acquire ownership in part by purchase and in part by legislation, as there is considerable state school land included in the district.

Debuschi, who visited Manila in August, emphasized that Japan's relations with the Philippines must avoid causing uneasiness or affront to the still sovereign United States.

"Japan's relations with the islands during the commonwealth period must take full cognizance of American opinion, and the three nations must cooperate along lines of mutual cooperation," he said.

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TINY AIRPLANE CREATES STRIKE IN AVIATION

Paris.—(AP)—The time is coming, some people think, when the strike of France will be greeted with a swarm of flying lice.

These things have been seen and heard, signifying a spattering sound across the heavens. They are multiplying, and the prospect is that some day the air will be darkened with them.

Should such things be, or shouldn't they? That is the question which has produced a Grade-A technical controversy in French aviation.

Supporters of the idea of the "Fly-lice"—literally the "Fly-lice"—declare that it is the biggest development in aeronautics since Wilbur and Orville Wright invented the airplane in 1903.

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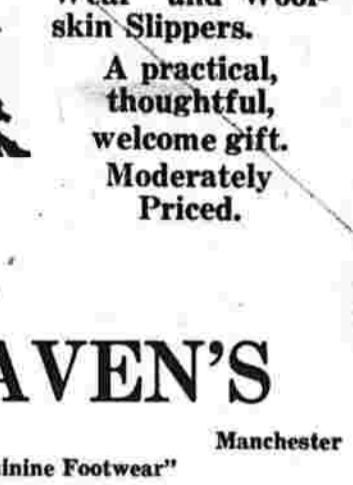
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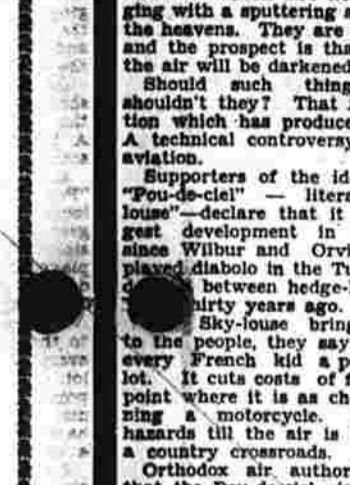
