





The outstanding symptom of angina pectoris is a sharp, stabbing pain in the chest, occurring in paroxysma, and the cause of the disorder is disease of the coronary arterica, the attack of angina pectoris is a sharp, stabbing representing an acute interference with the coronary circulation. In the average case of angina pectoris the coronary arteries are hardened and with this hardening of the arterics is often associated a partial or complete obstruction of some of the vessels. If the bardening process is limited chiefly to the sorta, then a partial closing of the mouth of one of the coronary arteries is a frequent finding.

Attacks of angina pectoris are likely to be brought on by exertion or exercise during which activity the heart muscle sends out a demand for an increased supply of oxygen if the arteries which are bringing the circulate the blood fast enough to supply the extra oxygen needed, then such a disturbance in the circulation of the coronary arteries will mean that certain areas of the heart are not receiving the full amount of oxygen required at the moment of exertion. 
