TOWN MEETING TO BE CALLED ON TAXES AUDIT

Will Be Held Between Christmas and New Year's Selections; Order Preparatory Survey.

A special town meeting to appropriate money for an audit of the accounts in the office of Tax Collector George H. Hoving and Town Treasurer George H. Waddell will be called by the selectmen between Christmas and New Year's, probably either December 27 or 30.

To Start Survey.
Monday morning, Guy Cambria of Middletown, member of the firm of Cambria, Both and Cambria, certified public accountants and tax collectors, will start a survey of the accounts in the treasurer's and collector's offices to ascertain what is the amount of the amount of work which will be involved.

Mr. Cambria is expected last night that his survey would be finished in four days.

The Board of Selectmen will meet Friday night to receive his report. The board's report for an agreement to the audit will be based on Cambria's estimate. It is expected that the survey will provide sufficient data for other C.P.A. firms willing to bid for the auditing job. The committee will be given an opportunity to make their own estimate.

Seven Year Audit.
Previously it had been estimated that the audit for seven years would cost between \$7,500 and \$10,000. It is understood that the auditing company which previously guaranteed the accuracy of the books in the office desires an audit for the last seven years.

The audit was made necessary when the Century Indemnity company of Hartford refused to renew its bond on other officials until the audit was made.

Mr. Waddell, who had previously held out hope to the selectmen that he would be able to complete a bond from other concerns told the selectmen last night that he believed it would be impossible for either him or Mr. Howe to obtain a bond without an audit.

To Get Wishes.
