### "NATIONAL INCOME"

Continuing to hold a somewhat open mind in the matter of the Townsend plan, we continue to be somewhat impressed by the fact that most of the arguments presented in opposition to it, when any arguments are presented, are constant of something like the following: It would take between nineteen and twenty million dollars a year to pay the Townsend plan beneficiaries their \$300 a month pensions. The total national income last year was only 48 billion; this year it may be 60 billion. Therefore the Townsend plan would be absorbing between one-half and one-third of the total income of all the American people. That certainly makes the Townsend plan look foolish. But precisely why do these debaters mean by "total national income" and when did "total national income" become a fixed or even approximately a fixed quantity? It is, as a matter of fact, extremely doubtful whether there is an economist anywhere who could figure out the "national income" on any basis which some other economist could not show to be 50 per cent erroneous. If national income is the total production of goods, commodities, services and services—and we know of no other basis of arguing that seems reasonable to us—then of course the limit of national income is not what was produced last year or this year nor in 1929 but the limit of the national plant and effort for production. Perhaps, if the brakes were thrown off, it might prove to be a hundred billion or two hundred billion or even more.

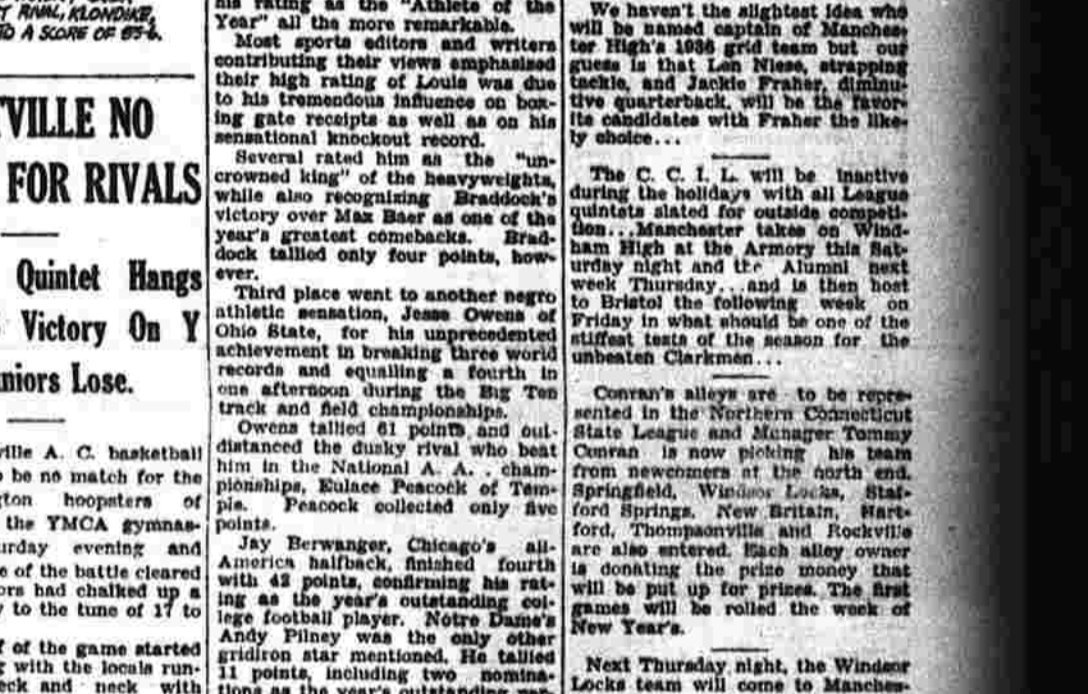
