MILNE FOUND ALIVE IN ROADSIDE DITCH; NO RANSOM IS PAID

Scion of Wealthy Family in Hospital Recovering from Injuries; G-Men Start Big Hunt for Kidnapers.

Doytstown, Pa., Dec. 18.—(AP)—Caleb Milne the Fourth, held four days by kidnapers was abandoned by his abductors without the payment of a cent of the \$50,000 ransom they had demanded, the Department of Justice announced today.

The 24-year-old grandson of a wealthy retired textile manufacturer of Philadelphia, heard from his father by a note that said his grandfather was ill, was found shortly before midnight—dead, 40 p. m. d. bruised and lacerated—beside a roadside ditch near here.

Today he was recovering in a Doytstown hospital. Doctors said his condition was not serious. Federal agents, who had the actor and mystery story writer in technical custody made no effort during the night to question him in detail. Physicians said he should be allowed to rest.

Milne was found by S. R. Gerhart, a Philadelphia salesman, and R. Morris Triguart, an inventor, who were driving along the old York road about midnight. Four youths, passing by in another car shortly afterward, assisted in getting the half-conscious youth to a hospital in Labaseth, Pa., nearby, where he received first aid before being brought here.

One of the first things he said was: "Don't stick those needles in me."

New York police had listed Milne merely as "missing," but Ed Roper, director of the Bureau of Investigation of the department of justice, stated in Washington today that his department was convinced it was a case of kidnaping.

After kidnapers however sent his men on a three-point drive to capture the kidnapers, working at New York, Philadelphia and Boston.

A picked detail of G-men—eight men who have worked on previous kidnaping cases which the government has solved—were concentrated in this territory. Two came from Chicago by plane, two from New York, and four from Washington.

NATIONAL DEBT NO WORRY, SAYS IRVING FISHER

Yale Economist Compares England's Debt With U. S.; Scores Those Who Start Campaign of Fear.

New Haven, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Prof. Irving Fisher, comparing the American per capita public debt with that of England, expressed belief today that the National debt of the United States is "nowhere near the breaking point."

Professor emeritus of economics at Yale, Professor Fisher criticized in a statement "those alarmists who are now apparently trying to make a new 'campaign of fear.' He charged them with unduly frightening the public over a "largely imaginary danger."

He said: "Certainly we, with a larger per capita income and a smaller per capita debt, could stand as large a debt as England, that is, \$900 per capita, a little more than 2 1/2 times our present National debt. Multiplying by 2 1/2, we get over 120 billions, of which 100 billions would be Federal if state and local remained the same."

Not up to Britain, we could multiply our present debt by 2 1/2 with out reaching the English burden, with all due consideration of comparative income and tax rates.

SEEK SUBSTITUTE FOR NEW DEAL AAA

G. O. P. Leaders Now Working On Program to Be Offered to the Farmers.

Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Some Republican leaders were reported today to be taking preliminary steps toward drafting a farm program which might be offered as a substitute for the New Deal's AAA.

G. O. P. circles were said to be quietly selecting a group of farm specialists to formulate a program they consider workable.

The Washington Post says Harrison Spangler of Iowa, director of Republican western headquarters, conceded that such a group is being formed. He declined to comment on its probable membership.

The paper reports that the group is being formed by a number of prominent Republicans, including Spangler, who is a vocal critic of the AAA.

The group is expected to meet in the near future to discuss the details of their proposed program. It is seen as a potential challenge to the New Deal's agricultural policies.

LEAGUE COUNCIL KILLS FRANCO-BRITISH PLAN

Project Which Caused Storm of Protests Eliminated—Italy Says League Now Responsible for Anything That Happens—Fear of Collapse of the League, Prompted Plan.

An Italian spokesman declared, immediately after the Council's action: "The League has killed the Franco-British proposal and now must stand the responsibility for what happens."

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GEN. CALLES DEFIES POLITICAL RIVALS

Former Dictator Is Branded As Traitor; Denies Plot to Revolt.

Mexico City, Dec. 18.—(AP)—General Plutarco Elias Calles, branded a "traitor" by the National Revolutionary Party he founded, defied the government's demand today that he leave the country.

"Mexico is my country and only by violence can they make me leave," Calles declared after the National Senate wrote him out of the party as a "traitor to the revolutionary program and a conspirator against the nation's institutions."

Calles said the agitation raised by the government, now headed by his political rival, President Lázaro Cárdenas, is "artificial and unjustified."

Governors of four states, ousted from their official positions for assisting Calles, yesterday defended the changes in administration in Sonora, Chihuahua, Coahuila and Queretaro, but were not accompanied peacefully.

Similar charges of conspiracy were preferred against five senators and Luis N. Morales, former minister of labor and economy, the latter being accused by the Senate of having been a participant.

NEW CARDINALS CREATED WITH ELABORATE RITES

Twenty Red Hats Conferred by Pope Pius; Tens of Thousands Watch Solemn Ceremonies.

Vatican City, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Pope Pius, in a ceremony of great pomp and solemn splendor, conferred red hats today upon 16 of the 20 new Cardinals he created in Monday's secret consistory.

The four new Cardinals, Cardinal Nuncio in Vienna, Madrid, Warsaw and Paris, will receive their hats at their posts.

Silver trumpets, sounded from a high balcony in the ancient cathedral of St. Peter, heralded the Pope's approach, as he came on the balcony to the throne of St. Peter, 12 scarlet-clad attendants, to the ceremony. He wore a white mitre.

Tens of thousands of the faithful pressed "Viva Pius" and waved their hands and handkerchiefs, many shouting "God bless the Pope" and "God bless the Holy Father" as he came to the balcony. The other two grabbed phones and rounded up 20 odd more Crismen men.

The Pope's reinforcement arrived slipping out of the Vatican and nondescript outer garments as they slipped on their hats.

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CORPORATION TAX LAW IS FURTHER DEFINED

Commissioner Points Out Two Features of Disallowance of Deductions and Interest Deductions.

A third release for publication of information pertaining to the new corporation business tax law was made by Tax Commissioner William H. Hackett today.

The commissioner called attention to what may be considered two of the most important features of the law, namely, the disallowance of a deduction of rental payments and the disallowance of a deduction of interest payments. These offices are not to be included with other deductions claimed in arriving at net income as re-defined in the new law.

These are particularly important factors to be considered because their disallowance will automatically reduce the taxable income and necessitate the payment of a greater amount of tax. The new law requires that they be paid in the past.
