Into the home, Miss Taylor said, the nurse carries her knowledge of disease prevention but in all her work she stresses the need of medical care and advice. She helps parents to understand why isolation should be carried out and help them to accomplish this. She also interests them in the necessity of immunization from preventable communicable diseases.

The public health nurse gives bedside care to the acutely and chronically iii in their homes but also teaches someone in the home how to give care in their absence. When nursing the sick, she teaches disease prevention and promotion of health to other members of the family. She gives valuable information in maternity as well as advice which will be helpful after the baby comes, aiding the mother to understand the normal growth and development of the child, and what may be expected at different age levels.

In school nursing she assists with inspections and physical examinations, and also stimulates interest

in industry.
