"LITTLE CAPITALS"
 The proposal of the National Resources Committee—which includes five members of the Cabinet and the Works Progress Administration—has been established ten or twelve regional federal "sub-capitals" to facilitate co-operation with the states on regional problems, undoubtedly strike many people as being a thoroughly workmanlike plan—if there is to be any permanency to the extension of federal economic and social activity which the New Deal has so blunderingly attempted to inaugurate.
 Of course the thirty agencies feel in duty bound to accept it as the only proposal that saves in the slightest degree of change from the old order of Bourbonism. And of course those oppositionists who take all their ease from the Liberty League will cry out against the plan as just one more proof of the purpose of "centralization" upon which the New Deal is predicated.
 Independent thinkers, however, are not likely to form their opinions of the "little capitals" scheme from premises set for them by Liberty League or extreme right-wing agitators. They will be likely to admit the force of the argument that if there is always this "it"—the national government in the center, into closer contact with, and assume any responsibility for, the economic and social problems of the American people its contacts would be much better effected and its responsibilities much better understood through the establishment of these regional listening posts and observation stations.
 Our own view, however, is that to go ahead with the proposed scheme at this time would be just one more of this administration's blunders in setting up elaborate, costly and hastily improvised machinery for the performance of functions without ever determining the federal right to perform these functions at all.
 We fought a terrible war and drenched our country in blood precisely for the very purpose of establishing the federal government's right to function in order to bring about a vital social change that of human chattel slavery—and to establish the principle of the parity of money of states rights. If we thought, then, that the fundamental sovereignty of the Union had been definitely and permanently determined. But the issue appears to be just as much alive today as it was in 1860, though the alignment of proposals and opponents is strangely different today.
 And with this question as troublesome right now as it was before the Civil War it will appear in many, many guises, as being unwarranted and altogether futile for this administration or any other to proceed as if it were an established principle that the federal government should, in haste, hereafter, a new and greatly expanded responsibility and authority in the arranging of social and economic change.
 President Roosevelt has never had the courage to face the towering issue created by the subdivision of the NRA. That decision of the Supreme Court brought him face to face with an inescapable fact—that he could not carry out his continuation program without the certainty that it would be attacked and beaten in detail with at least sufficient consistency to render his aspirations futile. A bigger and a braver centralist than he would have adopted one of three courses: He would have demanded that the whole subject be submitted to the country on the basis of Constitutional amendments; he would have "packed" the Supreme Court with judges of his own mode of thinking, or as the third alternative he would have completely disregarded the

opinion of the Supreme Court as long ago, did President Jackson. Failing the resolution to do one of these things or bettering that he had no right to do any of them, the manifest course of the bigger man would have been to abandon altogether his centralist theories and proceed as best he might along the lines laid down for him by the court.
 That, however, has not been Mr. Roosevelt's way. He and his advisors have been going ahead with the development of a number of these plans as they were presented on principles which they have every reason to expect will be repudiated, squandering vast sums of money and arranging to spend more on mechanisms whose validity he has not the qualities to develop.
 The "little capital" plan is an admirable one, standing alone; but it is useless for the administration of federal powers which have no status, which are under constant attack and which the President, from all indications, has not the slightest hope of defending, and giving a status. To put it into effect under present conditions and under the present leadership would be to create a lot more political and economic favorites and provide a very useful wheel in Mr. Roosevelt's personal political machine. And to provide a means for the spending of borrowed funds.
 A fine plan for a strong President, a useless and wasteful one for a shy and irresolute exhibitionist.
