SEE FURTHER DELAYS IN HAUPTMANN CASE; JURY TAKES RECESS

Startling Developments Are Promised When Jurors Resume The Probe—To Question Latest 'Suspect'.

Trenton, N. J., April 1.—(AP)—The sensation-soaked Lindbergh case, still reeling from the literally last minute halting of Bruno Richard Hauptmann's execution last night, was threatened with further startling developments today.

The new break, the nature of which was not disclosed, promised to come from the Mercer county jury's investigation of charges that the murder of the baby Lindbergh was done by Paul H. Winter.

The county prosecutor, Erwin Marston, announced that the jury's investigation, scheduled to be held tomorrow afternoon, had been deferred until tomorrow morning to permit the jury to be sworn into court.

Parker, conducting his own investigation of the Lindbergh case, believed that Hauptmann was not guilty of the crime, is the man who obtained the three "confessions" which were largely the basis of the Grand Jury's decision to delay in Hauptmann's execution plans last night.

Truman's Sentences. The exact nature of the development could not be made public until immediately after the trial, but it was indicated it would be sensational.

WHAT NEXT? QUESTION ASKED IN TRENTON NOW

Jury's Decision in Bruno Case Called One Of Most Unusual Moves In Legal History.

Discussions, always tinged with uncertainty because of the many surprising developments in the fantastic case of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, revived all over town today.

Wherever two or more got together, the subject of the "what next" question was the day's developments were more unpredictable than ever by yesterday's events, which reached a spectacular climax as Hauptmann was snatched from the electric chair in the most unusual move in legal history.

He criticized the state's case against him and asked why Dr. John E. (Jack) Gordon, Lindbergh ransom intermediary, "hides so many things he knows before every body here had been counting" the minutes, the quarter hours.

The developments paraded swiftly by the hearing before Supreme Court Justice Thomas V. Trenci, who, in the opinion of many, was the best man to hear the case.

REIDS ENTHUSE OVER FLORIDA

Return From Winter In The Peninsular State More Ardent In Praise Than Ever.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert M. Reid who recently returned from Florida where they have been since early in February, are more enthusiastic than ever over the peninsular state as a winter resort. According to Mr. Reid, who has been journeying to Florida for a number of years, the winter business with pleasure more people than ever before look time out to play this winter under Florida's tropical sun. Mr. and Mrs. Reid toured more than 5,000 miles, and took occasion everywhere they stopped where Manchester people were located to pay their visits. Markers on cars indicated that tourists came from every state in the nation, and Florida's borderlines were taxed to the utmost.

Gathered about the enthusiastic gathering of shells and the ocean added thousands to her already sizeable collection. While her husband was busy on his real estate and appraisal work, Mrs. Reid hid herself to the nearest beach and while enjoying the benefits of the sun and the bracing salt air, basked herself gathering up the shells and coral. Of the latter she has some fine specimens, including the branching lacey coral, tree, finger, rose, mushroom and many other varieties. One large oval of intricate pattern weighs many pounds, and was found by Mr. Reid.

Typically interesting in shape and variety are the starfish and horse shoe crabs and the scales of tarpon, fish weighing 200 pounds. Tarpon springs, Florida, is the greatest sponge center in the world, and each one lectured and covered varieties are to be found in the field collection. No curio display from Florida would be complete without the huge tortoise, peacocks, shagbark and hickory nuts. All are to be found in the "Little Bit of Florida" in the Reid Main street home, together with branches of dried orange lemons and "homemade" omelets, Spanish moss, "fatwood" pine, and bamboo wood and growing plant containers many inches in diameter. Among the photographs taken of places of interest, were a number of former Manchester people, or their homes in their adopted state.

While Mrs. Reid was exhibiting the interesting things she has acquired on her recent trip, Mr. Reid expatiated on the fertility of Manatee county and Florida, in general, and the area of celery, the fine strawberries and other fruits and vegetables that are canned or otherwise preserved right on the plantations. He regaled the reporter on "sweetened" oranges and rich nuts, and called attention to his own pet hobby, collecting walking snails of which he has nearly a hundred from all parts of the world. His snails, he explained, are of various sizes and colors, and he has produced a jar of amazingly fine snails from the beach at Sarasota, Fla., in the West Coast.

As for the shells, which Floridians make up into all sorts of trays and novelties for tourists to take home, Mr. Reid showed the finished work and the shells used in making them. A few of the more common ones are eyes, ears, bleeding teeth, tiger eyes, pyramids, Panama, green shells, coffee, pearl and shells, crown shells, turkey wings, cow shells, etc. They range in size from a small shell to the large conch shell, and in color from the gamut from pure white to deep red and rich brown. The shells exhibited articles made from the shells of California and colorful "rocks" from the petrified forests of Arizona, she confessed a weakness for collecting rocks and already has stalactites and quartz from several hundreds of feet below the surface of the earth, and rocks from over 40 states. The rocks are numbered, placed in the rock garden and a corresponding number and description is retained for reference.

 NO FURTHER SURPRISE

Beyond expressing the conviction that the state of New Jersey has distinguished itself for inadequacy as a civilized entity beyond anything in ancient or modern history in Europe, Asia, Africa or the three Americas, we have no words in any degree commensurate to the unparalleled and unimagined situation in that state today.

The dog-fight of Governor Hoffman and known and unknown allies to save the life of the most notorious murderer this country has ever known is marked by a quality of desperation as patent as it is impossible to comprehend.

After what occurred last evening—the serious consideration of the most abominably fabricated “confession” ever penned, at only to be put into the mouth of some of the creatures also encountered in Wonderland, by a grand jury in a country without a shadow of jurisdiction in the case; the exclusion of competent officials from the jury room; the warden's spotlighted postponement of the execution of Hauptmann—the only thing in all this hideously corrupted case that now would really surprise the country would be the eventual carrying out of the sentence of the trial court.

It certainly would create no surprise whatever if the next step were to be the “escape” of Hauptmann from the Trenton prison. TOWNSENDERS
 There is considerable evidence that the Townsend plan organization is either going to pieces or on the verge of it. Resignation from the movement of Representative John B. This group, being quite unable to figure out the precise implications of the Townsend plan principle, have denounced it as insanity—and have brought against it arguments for more insipid and displaying far greater economic ignorance than those of the most liberal-minded Townsends who have swallowed the Doctor's two-hundred-month-for-everybody-over-60-hook, line and sinker.

But to people who have an unimpaired consciousness that there are few things the matter with this fair land of ours who cannot shut their eyes to the fact that there is such a thing in the world as social and economic injustice, and who feel that perhaps we had better do something about it before it is too late, there would be little satisfaction in witnessing a complete collapse of this remarkable solidarity known as the Townsend Movement.

But it is a righteous and, we believe, a workable principle—both socially and economically sound.

 The Waterbury Republican, starting editorially with the subject of the respective merits of the gallows and the electric chair as agencies for the infliction of the death penalty, has pointed out the ancient issue of the usefulness or uselessness of capital punishment. It employs the somewhat familiar argument that criminals frequently escape punishment altogether to murder case because juries so often hesitate to take the irrevocable step of bringing in a verdict of guilty when they make the death sentence obligatory.

Surely that contention is scarcely applicable to the state of Connecticut. In this state, and for all we know in many other, a jury can always vote the penalty in a murder case by returning a verdict of guilty in the second degree, no matter if the indictment is for first degree homicide and all the circumstances make it a first degree case beyond question if there is guilt at all. We believe we are correct in saying that in no murder case in the nation does the commonwealth have a court required to accept a second degree verdict in a first degree case.

Then why should juries be represented as being confronted by the alternative of imposing the death penalty or equipping a murderer with capital case? As a matter of fact, juries are allowed a latitude in this respect that has puzzled many people for a long time—and which certainly frees them from the dilemma of either sending a defendant to his death or setting him free; so far at least as Connecticut is concerned.
