#### Three Major Veterans' Organizations Are Agreed On the Cash Payment.

Washington, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Lightning action in Congress on the soldiers' bonus was witnessed today as leaders of three major veterans organizations lined up behind a new plan for immediate cash payment.

The ex-soldiers' leaders argued their plan would cost only \$1,000,000,000 immediately, instead of the \$2,000,000,000 annually mentioned in the form of an incentive, in the form of a loan, to be repaid by the government.

It was announced by the heads of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the United American Veterans, that a compromise bonus bill would be introduced in the House before the close of next week.
