An outline of the peace proposals was made by Grey in a memorandum February 22, 1916. Marking the document "confidential" Grey wrote:

"Colonel House told me that Desident Wilson was ready. President Wilson was ready, on hearing from France and England that the moment was opportune, to propose that a conference should be summoned to put an end to the war. Should the Allies accept this proposal, and should Germany re-fuse it, the United States would probably enter the war against Ger-

"Colonel House expressed the opinion that, if such a conference met, it would secure peace on terms not unfavorable to the Allies; and, if it failed to secure peace, the United States would (probably) leave the conference as a belligerent on the side of the Allies, if Germany was unreasonable. To Protect Itself.

"If the Allies delayed accepting the offer of President Wilson and if, later on, the course of the war was so unfavorable to them that the in-tervention of the United States would not be effective, the United States would probably disinterest themselves in Europe and look to their own protection in their own way." Both House and Grey made public


