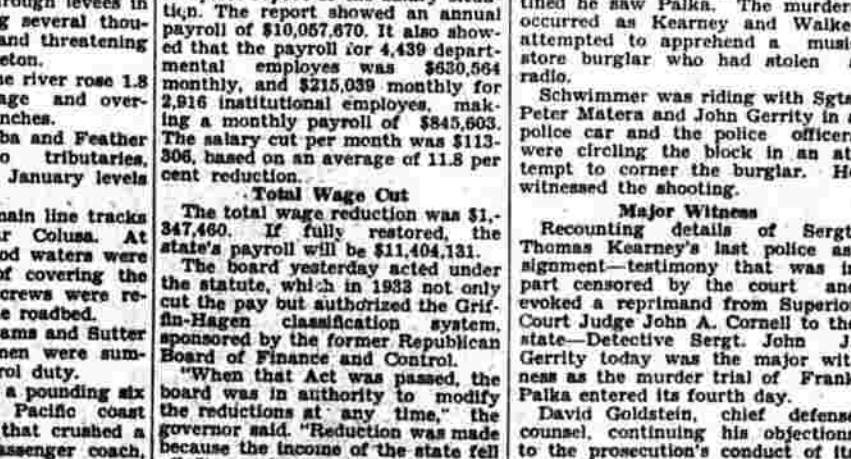

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Airplane of the Future Described by Engineers

Detroit, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The airplane of the future, designed to eliminate most of the hazards encountered in landing, will permit a pilot to land in a manner similar to that of a conventional airplane, but with the precision of Fred E. Weick, senior engineer of the Detroit advisory committee for aviation, in a paper read today at the convention of the society of automotive engineers. "Learning to land" is largely a matter of experimental flying, but the airplane is guided to the runway by a radio beam. By means of improved wing control, freedom from danger of stalling was obtained in an experimental plane built by Weick and two fellow engineers, he said. Glider-like in appearance, the airplane will be equipped with a radio beam which will be used to guide the plane to the runway. It is expected to be ready for service in a few months.
