JUDGE INGLIS FINDS FOR MRS. SUMNER

Renders Defendant's Verdict in Suit Following Bolton Fatalities.

Judge Ernest A. Inglis of Middletown today rendered a defendant's verdict in the suit brought by Mrs. Henry Wier and Mrs. Margaret Saragun. The plaintiff sought recovery of the estate of her son, Chester M. Joyce, against Mrs. Edna Sumner of Bolton Center for damages resulting in the death of her son which occurred at Bolton Center, June 9, 1933.

In his decision Judge Inglis stated that Mrs. Sumner, operator of the automobile involved in the fatal accident, was negligent in any way in the operation of her car. The faulty operation of the motor vehicle by Joyce on the automobile driven by Mrs. Sumner was regarded as a substantial factor in the accident. Joyce was instantly killed and John Fracchia, a passenger on the Joyce motorcycle, was fatally injured in the crash.

All credible evidence presented at the trial was in Mrs. Sumner's favor. Judge Inglis ruled. No credible evidence was presented to prove that Mrs. Sumner's automobile had been on the wrong side of the road shortly before the crash, a point which the attorney for the plaintiff sought to prove. The collision was caused, Judge Inglis ruled, by the contributory negligence of Joyce.

In a previous trial brought by the estate of John Fracchia, against Mrs. Sumner, a defendant's verdict also given. More than a score of witnesses from Bolton and Manchester testified at the trial which was held in Rockville, January 8 and 9.

Attorney William M. Harney of Hartford and associate counsel represented the plaintiff and Attorney Frank E. Daily and H. D. O'Connell were counsel for the defense.

HOME OF HOFFMAN HEAVILY GUARDED

New Jersey Governor Receives Many Threatening Letters; His Children Are Also Placed Under Guard.

Newark, N. J., Jan. 18.—(AP)—The Newark Ledger in copyrighted story said today the home of Gov. Harold G. Hoffman at South Amboy is under heavy guard because of letters threatening the life of Mrs. Hoffman and their three children.

State police and city authorities, the paper said, have been ordered to guard the Hoffman family "after a flood of extortion threatening communications had been received. The police are guarding the Hoffman family at the executive offices and the governor's home."

It was revealed that the two Hoffman children, a girl and a boy, were being escorted to and from classes by police officers.

The children are Ada, 14, a student at the Harrell G. Hoffman school, named in honor of her father, and Lillian, 9, who attends grade school. The other child is Howard, 7.

"Despite the services of a guard force of 100 men, Hoffman keeps continuous guard over little two-year-old children."

Threatened Children One of the letters sent to Mrs. Hoffman told her, the paper said, that if her husband did not drop his interest in Hauppauge, New York, her children would suffer the consequences.

"It is understood," the Ledger said, "that anonymous notes threatening violence have been turned to postal inspectors and handwriting experts in Federal service."

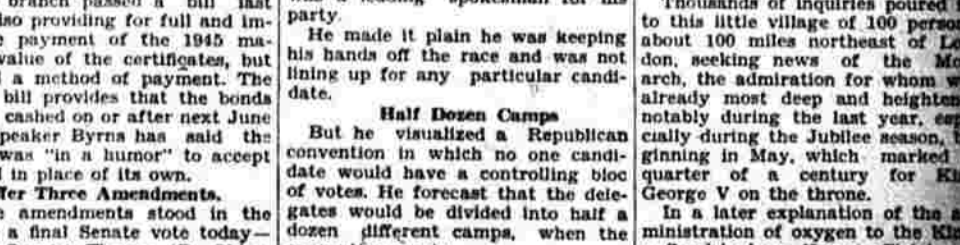
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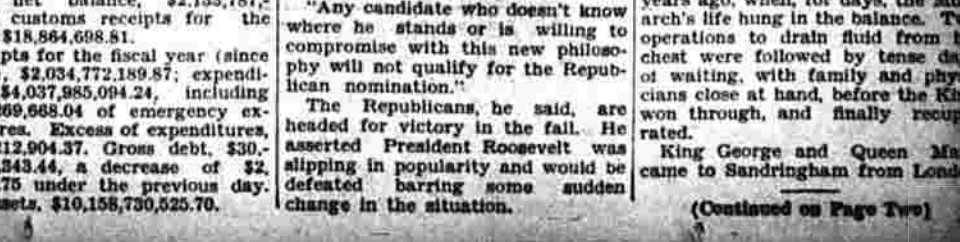

Coolidge, the treasury aide, is believed to be retiring from the Treasury Department because of his sympathy with the New Deal.

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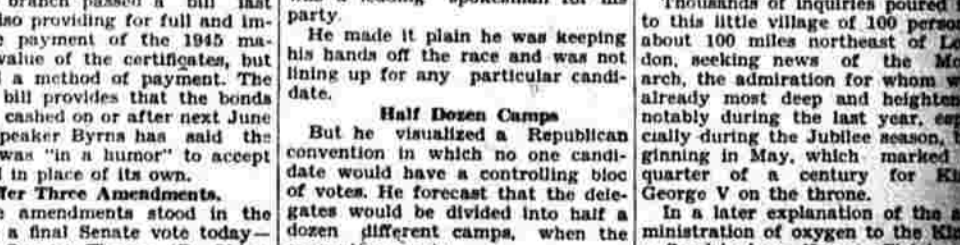

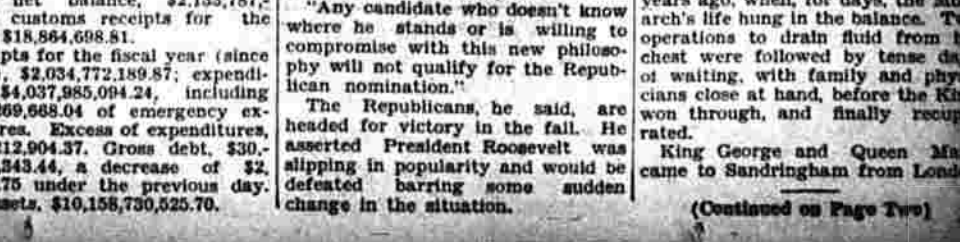

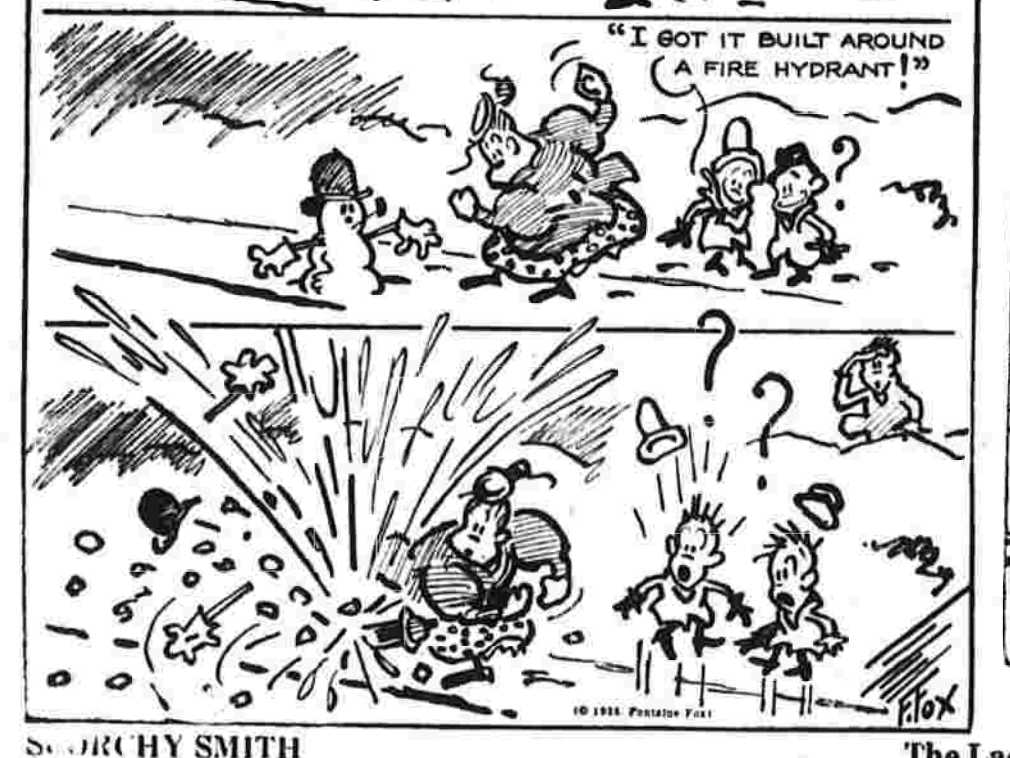
