Washington, Jan. 22.—At the time of the 1933 massacre of little pigs, which brought on so much criticism, Mrs. Roosevelt herself is supposed to have made the naive suggestion that remain in the creation of the FRBC—the Federal Relief Corporation—

More Blows at FRBC

The next blow came when AAA decided to devote more than half the money to subsidizing southern cotton farmers and indicated that much of the rest would be spent on dumping commodities abroad.

Then, late in December, General Joseph P. Kamp, Jr., of the War Relocation Authority, announced that there isn't a single man in the United States who is not a member of the FRBC.

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# BRITAIN'S NEW KING

## Shift Marked In Recent Years From Playboy to Student; Travel and Wide Contacts Are Background For the Monumental Task Ahead

In days of strain and stress for all the world, but especially for the vast empire he is called to rule, Edward Albert, long known as the Prince of Wales, becomes a paramount figure. This is the first of a series of six stories by Milton Bronner, NEA Service, London correspondent, whose long residence there gives him unusual qualifications to present this up-to-the-minute and intimate picture of the man who will be known to the future as Edward VIII.

London, Jan. 22.—When death came for King George V, and Edward VIII automatically became King of England, death came also to another world figure.

That was the slim, boyish-looking sportsman and globe-trotter known to a generation of newspapermen as the Prince of Wales. In due time the man who has held that title for little more than 25 years, will be duty proclaimed "Our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord Edward VIII, by the Grace of God King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Empire, beyond the seas, Descent of the Faith, and Defender of India."

Then the Prince of Wales will indeed be dead. In beginning his reign he steps into another character, begins another life. There are many evidences that this new life had begun even before the death of his father, George V. Of late years, Edward had become markedly more serious, more mature. He is nearly 42, though the rigid care with which he has preserved his youthful figure and appearance deceived many.

As king, the free-and-easy manner, the informal appearance in public, the globe-trotting, the night-clubbing, the comparatively simple manner of life, will all become impossible.

**Deep Affection Between Edward and His Father**

Despite past rumors that Edward Albert did not intend to ascend the throne, it is now clear that he faces his task resolutely though perhaps reluctantly. That reluctance has been somewhat misunderstood as an unwillingness to assume the staggering responsibility of heading the empire which the sun never sets, and under whose figure lives one of every four people on the face of the earth.

But the truth is nearer to this: Between the father, George V, and the son, there has been an extraordinary devotion and affection. Contrary to many princes, who have been always keenly hated, his father would live and reign for a long, long time.

Part of the reluctance undoubtedly comes from realization that ascending the throne means the end of being a lone eagle, and becoming a bird in a gage.

**Friends Justice Left Those for His Own Amusement**

As Prince of Wales, of course, Edward was never a free man. But he had more freedom than his ruling father. As prince, Edward had many public duties to perform and the list of obligations laid down below him each morning was long and onerous. Much of his time was not his own. But there was still left many hours and days which he could enjoy like any other Englishman of means.

He could go off to Montreal, Mexico, and without any fuss or feathers follow the Bohemian hours, though even that meant pleasure has been denied him in recent years, due to public apprehension that he might be in a gage.

In London he could unobtrusively buy a couple of seats in a theater and attend the show with a friend. He could slip over to the Embassy Club, sit at a little table with friends, like anybody else, and dance with womanly friends.

He could pop into a friend's house in the afternoon for a cup of tea and an informal chat, or he could travel, range the world and the empire, run over to America for a few weeks of "roughing it" on his "Z. P. Ranch" in Alberta.

As King Edward, His Life Becomes "Ceremonious"

All that is gone now, and with it goes the Prince of Wales of the sportsman and the popular magazine. What Edward did as Prince of Wales he can do no longer.

When he visits the home of a friend, it is a royal procession of state. When he goes to the theater he must sit rigid and quiet in the royal box.

The king may not go quietly to the Embassy Club for an afternoon of dancing. The king may not take impromptu trips about Europe, for if he does, the crown must be placed in commission during his absence, and that is a bothersome and complicated business.

The king must live pretty much at home in his various castles and palaces. He must be on hand constantly for consultation with his ministers. He has no more of the motor and boring diners and functions to give and to attend.

When he decides, it is very gravely at his own palace, and then only in the most rigidly ceremonial way, with only the socially select.

**Travels Gave the Prince Broad Knowledge of the People**

The life as prince which Edward now leaves behind him had this advantage: It gave him a wide knowledge of the world and of people which came to few monarchs reared in seclusion.

### Throne Puts Restrictions On Once Carefree Prince

The transition from Princeton to the throne of the Duke of York, Edward VIII, will be a dramatic one, for it will mean the end of a life of carefree pleasure and the beginning of a life of duty and responsibility.

Edward had worked hard to earn his money, and he had been a member of the Princeton University football team. He had also been a member of the Princeton University tennis team.

There is little doubt that Edward will continue as one of the best dressed men in his Empire. That distinction was likewise one often applied to Edward VII.

There are many things the Prince of Wales loved to do which one wonders whether he will be able to do now that he is king.

He liked to dance, sometimes to early hours of the morning in the gay rendezvous of Mayfair or Paris, to ride hard to hounds and in the dangerous point-to-point races. He played a better-than-average game of golf, was fair at polo and was known as Britain's best dressed man.

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### BACK TAX COLLECTIONS

#### \$190,000 SINCE AUG. 16

Expect Payments Will Exceed \$200,000 by March; Will Help Reduce Amount to Be Raised by Taxes.

Nearly \$190,000 in back taxes of the last eight years, interest on the delinquent accounts and lien fees was collected by Tax Collector George H. Howe during the first four and a half months of the fiscal year which began August 16, 1935. (City's \$100,000 less than reported to the selectmen.

The amount which the selectmen borrowed on temporary notes last July to make up a deficit caused by inadequate collection of taxes.

Receipts from sources other than property taxes which the selectmen estimated last September, reduce the amount needed to balance the budget voted in November to \$193,371.20.

By list time of the adjourned annual town meeting in March, when the selectmen will report on the collection of back taxes will have exceeded \$200,000. It is believed that the total amount of back taxes properly taxed to less than the \$200,000 which the selectmen would raise on a grand list of \$36,000,000.

The amount of the grand list will not be known until the end of the month, but it is predicted that the grand list that it would be about \$36,000,000.

Considering the reduced valuation of property for the past two years, the tax rate of \$2.25 on the \$36,000,000 appraisal, a 24 mill tax rate would yield \$792,000, which is \$192,000 in excess of the \$600,000 needed to balance the budget.
