All current expenses and benevolent contributions during the past year have been paid in full. The reports of the various organizations of the church also indicated that they were in sound financial condition.

Penny Collection

An interesting item was contained in the fact that 53,560 pennies were turned into the church treasure for a debt reduction of \$535.50, this amount being obtained through the Penny-A. Meal offerings begun last year and voted to be continued this year. It was also reported that the Ladles' Aid Society had transferred its entire treasury to the church, amounting to \$653.00. Other organisations also made sizeable contributions during the year.

Rev. K. E. Erickson's report brought out that the church has a membership of 931 persons in all, with 354 men and 427 women and 150 children.
