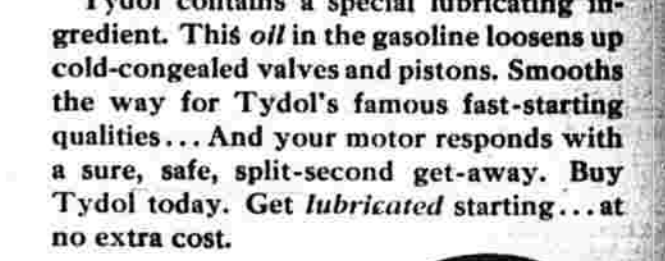
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### Sidewalks As Substitute For Subways Now Seen

New York, Jan. 30.—(AP)—The "sidewalk" substitute for subways, which will carry passengers a mile in a little more than four minutes, was described in the latest form to the American Institute of Electrical Engineers today.

The "sidewalk" is a double-deck, one-track, electrically operated, starts and stops with its companion street cars, but loads from its intermediate construction. Norman W. Storey, of the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, of East Pittsburgh, said the "sidewalk" will cost less to construct and install than subways and use less power.

Storey credited Elbezer Hawkins of Lulu, La., with originating the "sidewalk" idea in 1914. He cited many mechanical devices, experimented with subsequently and those in recent years which have seemed on the point of success, but have not been used.
