Trains Held Up In Mississippi Because Bridge Is Washed Out.

Meriden, Miss., Feb. 4.—(AP)—An Illinois Central passenger train west bound from New York arrived safely through hours late at Newton, Miss., early today, officials of the railroad said here. Virtually all traffic was halted in this section by more than seven inches of rain with 24 hours.
