The business of archeological research is all very fine and noble, but Count Byron de Prorok, who has done his share of it, likes to have a little excitement mixed with it. He doesn't feel flappy unless he is dodging poisoned darts in a Central American jungle, or out-facing a bloodthirsty Touareg tribesman in the Sahara.

He aest forth this point of view in his new book, "In Quest of Lost Worlds."

Herein he recites some of his archeological adventures of the last decade, says frankly that he caresites for the plodding spade work of this science than for the thrills of risk and discovery, and gives a readable exciting account of his doings.

Between thrills, he devotes himself to expounding his theory of a great "Atlantean" civilization which, in prehistoric times, may have thrown its influence across a great belt of earth, from Egypt to Central America.

Furthermore, he believes that he has found the fabled land of Ophir, where King Solomon got his gold, in the Kingdom of Ethiopia.

Occasionally one feels that Count de Prorok is more interested in the thrills of the quest than in archeology itself. However that may be, his book is eminently readable.

One of the important duties of the red cell is to carry exygen from the lungs to the tissues all over the body. The extraordinary power of the red blood cell to absorb oxygen is given it by a special substance it contains, called hemoglobin. Hemoglobin is the coloring matter which makes the red blood cell red and contains iron. When the red blood cells are reduced in number, the patient is said to have anemis. Usually, there is a corresponding reduction in hemoglobin at the same time.
