TOWN DEBT EXCEEDS STATUTORY LIMITS

However, There's No Need to Worry Since Limit Was Reached Through Grand List Reduction; Will Be Corrected by Next Payment.

The reduction of nearly \$5,522,000 made in the grand list this year by the Board of Assessors, following the re-assessment, has caused the town debt to exceed the statutory limit. The total indebtedness allowed by the state statute is \$4,500,000. The town debt is now \$4,522,000. The excess of \$22,000 will be corrected by the next payment.

The statute governing bonded indebtedness of municipalities reads in part as follows: "No town shall incur any bonded indebtedness in excess of the sum of \$4,500,000. The amount of the bonded indebtedness shall be ascertained by adding together the principal amount of all bonds outstanding, the principal amount of all bonds authorized to be issued, and the principal amount of all bonds which have been voted but not yet issued."

Manchester's borrowing capacity, based on the current grand list of \$36,000,000 plus the specified exempt property valued at \$2,000,000, is \$5,522,000. The town debt is now \$4,522,000. The excess of \$22,000 will be corrected by the next payment.

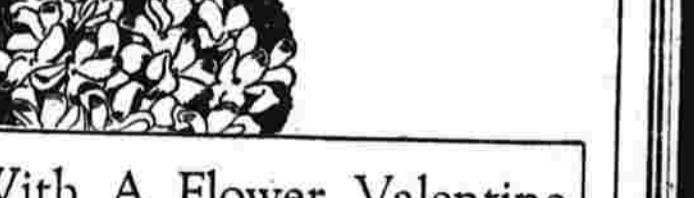
