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DICKINSON IS 3D REPUBLICAN OUT FOR PRESIDENCY
Declares Himself in Race But Won't Enter Primaries; Landon Men Wonder About His Intentions.

Washington, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The political men looked toward the prairie today as word came that Senator Dickinson of Iowa had declared himself in the race for the Republican Presidential nomination. Dickinson, 57, said he would enter the race in the Republican Presidential primary in Iowa on Feb. 20. He said he would not try to be a candidate in any other state.

Today in the last for filling in Illinois a state where backers of Colonel Gray will play with vigor, and Senator Borah of Idaho will do battle for in advance of congressional days. Dates for the several other primary states will be announced in the next few days. Senator Dickinson's Iowa primary is the only one in the country where he will appear in person.

For some time there have been indications that President Roosevelt and Senator Borah, a solidly Republican, would be the primary candidates in the year.

Leader: Quiet
Aside from Landon's speech at Toledo, Kan., several days ago in which he touched upon current events, Dickinson has been quiet. He is reported to be in Chicago, where he is waiting for a potential candidate, Colonel Knox, on the other hand has been on an anti-New Deal speaking tour in the East for some time.

Before Knox left Boston, last night to return to Chicago, he called another blow against what he called "the insanity of the New Deal." He said he would support the Republican New Deal in the November election.

One of the reasons for the pro-Republican sentiment in the East is the fact that the New Deal has been born, but boyed "my friends in Massachusetts to find it expedient to join with those in other New England states to support my candidacy."

Former President Hoover, on the hunt against the New Deal, said he would support the New Deal if Secretary Hoover should be elected.

Hoover's declaration of the country is facing the most critical situation in 10 years," and pledged himself to "continue fighting the New Deal as long as it exists." He and his associates, Ben Allen, went to Seattle to confer with State Republican leaders.

The Non-Partisan Woman Congress sponsored by the Chicago Tribune heard attacks on the defense of the New Deal last night. Senator Borah (D., Ky.), the 1932 keynoter, challenged "those who indulge in unintelligent and injudicious criticism of the administration."

Few will deny the correctness of this conclusion. It is money to pay for the oil of the United States, provided Italy can find the money to pay for the oil to defeat any project on the part of the United States.

It is Italy that makes the other combination looking to an ending of the war by cutting off Mussolini's oil supplies.

If Italy should join with the Ethiopians it is most difficult to see how we could deny the assertion that we helped her do it.

It is that neutrality? Hardly.

On the other hand, if we joined in the oil sanctions, to the end that Italy lost the war, how would we answer her accusation that we took sides with Ethiopia?

And would that be neutrality? Again hardly.

But suppose we took the ground that we would neither help Ethiopia by joining in sanctions nor help Italy by cutting off her oil supplies. This would mean that we would continue to sell Italy as much oil as she would be buying from us if there were no war. This would mean that we would be striking a peace-time average—we would not be getting a close to absolute neutrality in performance as it would be possible to get? It would seem so.

Yet it has not been possible for us to get any Congressional action because Mr. Roosevelt insists that the decision as to what materials, and the manipulation of the situation, this country shall sell to belligerents or withhold from them, or the amount to be sold, shall be determined by him rather than by law.

Apparently all hope has been abandoned of any effective neutrality legislation at this season, and the President is exercising his autocratic powers over this nation's dealings with belligerents.

If the administration had not assigned itself against such a solution there is very little doubt that Congress might have been brought to the customary needs of the customers in times of peace—but would make that restriction mandatory, unescapable and applicable to both sides.

SUBJECT OF PROBE

New White Collar Project Is Result of Requests Made by Trade Groups.

Washington, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The government set out today to find out what people do with money.

It hopes to accomplish this by the end of the fiscal year, June 30, through a coordinated survey by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and the Bureau of Home Economics.

Authorized as a PWA "white collar" project, the survey will be carried out with a peak enrollment of 4,000 persons from the relief rolls.

They will draw an average annual salary of \$1,000.

They will try to find out what others earn and what they spend.

Officials said the list of regional offices scheduled for Providence, R. I., Columbus, O., Atlanta, Ga., Denver, Colo., and Portland, Ore., have been named and that sectional work has started in New York and Chicago.

The information was requested by various trade groups.

Aids Advertisers

Officials said they will be valuable to advertisers in that it will show the percentage of the average income goes for food, housing, wearing apparel, transportation, personal spending and taxes, savings, health education, social activities, and other items.

Previous information either was inadequate or outdated, it was said.

This survey, officials said, will cover the full income range from the regular monthly salary to incomes from \$7,500 to \$10,000. Above that is an income of \$20,000 or more.

Investigations will be made by salaried government experts.

Survey Directors

The Bureau of Labor Statistics will direct the survey in 45 centers, each of which will include one large city and one or two smaller cities. The population, total cities averaging between 40,000 and 75,000 and average cities of from 8,000 to 18,000 population.

Bureau surveys will be made by the Bureau of Home Economics Department during the next week, it was said.

Some 1919-1920 figures showed about 11.5 per cent of the family income was spent for food, 18.1 per cent for housing, 11.9 per cent for transportation, 9.6 per cent for clothing, 12.0 per cent for health, 10.0 per cent for recreation, 10.0 per cent for savings, 10.0 per cent for insurance, 10.0 per cent for other.

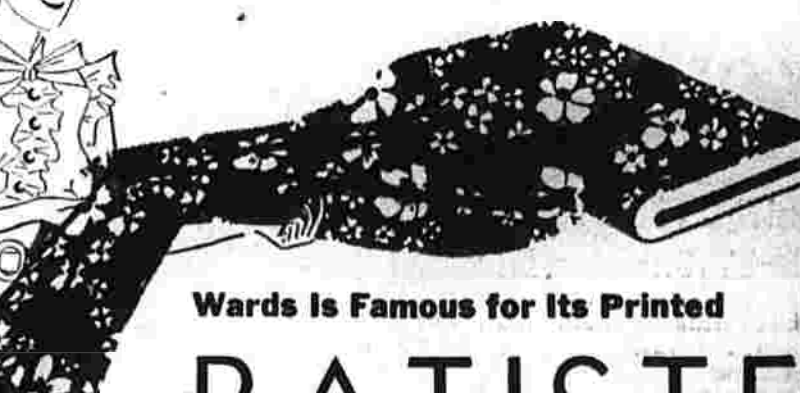
