TOWN EXPENSES LESS THAN WAS ESTIMATED

Fiscal Year Half Completed With Receipts Slightly Ahead; Treasurer Waddell Prepares Statement of Condition.

The total of municipal government expenditures during the first half of the fiscal year was approximately half the amount appropriated by the town meeting last fall, while the receipts from sources other than taxation were considerably more than was estimated by the selectmen when they prepared their budget recommendations last September.

A financial statement for the six months ending February 15, 1936, today by Town Treasurer George H. Waddell revealed the condition of the town's finances.

The statement shows a net surplus of \$209,000 for the six months ending February 15, 1936, compared to the balance left for the same period last year of \$101,656.

The actual receipts for the first six months exceeded the estimate by \$16,374.76. Liquor license fees were greater than was anticipated by \$10,616.66.

The amount to be raised by property taxation is reduced as of February 14, to \$1,051,490.14.

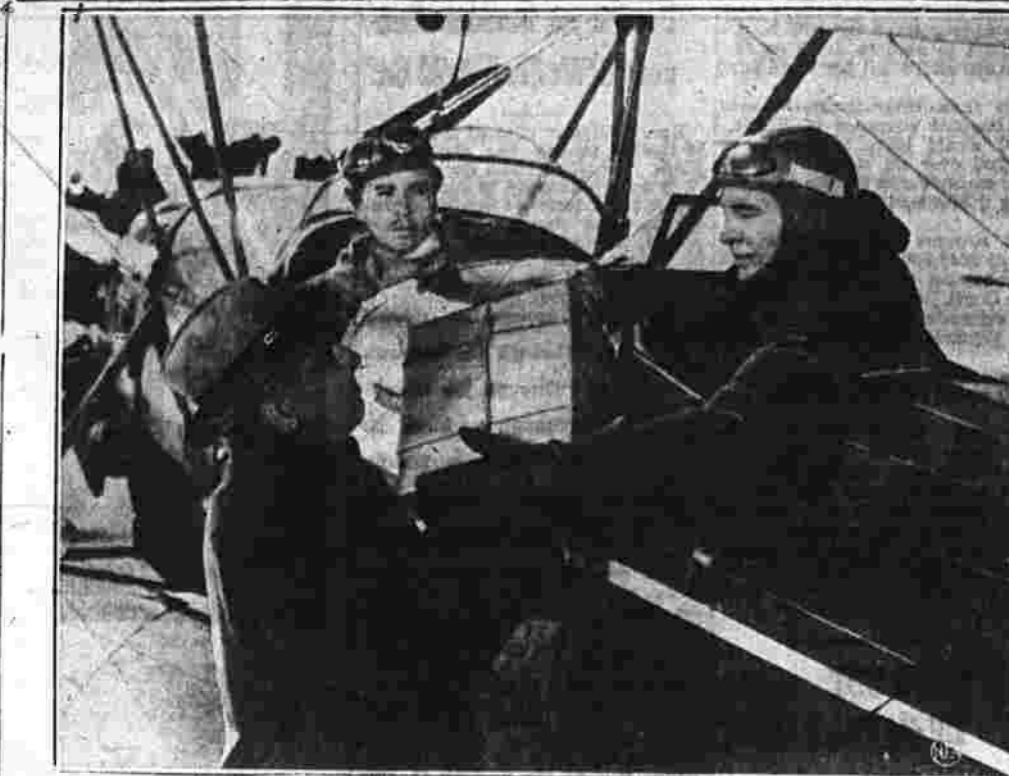

ALLEGHENY RIVER CONTINUES RISING

Banks for Over 100 Miles Flooded; Residents Flee to Higher Grounds.

Pittsburgh, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Rising steadily, the ice-jammed Allegheny river sent the highest flood level to nine years ago in Pittsburgh today after inundating parts of many communities along its banks for more than 100 miles.

Waters spread over the river-front streets in the city's downtown district, flooding cellars of homes and industrial plants.

Houseboat dwellers abandoned their homes as a 10-mile ice gorge moved slowly along the rest of the Ohio. Residents of river colonies clustered about homes, their belongings piled on the banks as they waited for the waters to recede.

Streets in low sections of the suburbs of Oakmont, Verona and Harrisville were under water.

Eight Feet in Hour. The Allegheny rose eight feet in one hour at Lock No. 5 near Kittanning, Pa., while the gorge moved by.

In Pittsburgh, where the Allegheny and Monongahela meet to form the Ohio, the river on Feb. 27 set a record, rising 27 feet in 24 hours.

The weather bureau predicted it would rise to 30 feet today and then subside.

Ice cakes were strewn about many rural roads.

The 300,000 residents of the village of Kelly moved out en masse to escape the waters behind the gorge and couriers went up and down the valley warning other river dwellers.

Evacuees speculated on the effect the jam would have if it continues to move on Pittsburgh, where a

stage of 38 feet, three feet above flood level, had been predicted. They hoped the Monongahela falling where it meets the Allegheny to form the Ohio—would take care of the now-rising water.

POLICEMAN WITNESS TAKES HIS OWN LIFE
Second Death in Florida's Famous Mob; Floozing Case Witness Appeared Worried.

Tampa, Fla., Feb. 28.—(AP)—Aching Chief of Police W. D. Blair disclosed today that Police Sergeant H. Carl Tomkins was a witness in a mob "floozing" case, which resulted in the death of a third-floor hotel window last night.

Chief Blair said the death, second in the investigation started "undoubtedly was a suicide." Tomkins had been admitted to the hospital Feb. 16 for treatment for an infected leg.

Nurses said the patient had a high fever and at times appeared worried.

Tomkins was on duty as desk sergeant several months ago when Joseph Schenker and two companions were questioned by police about "Communist activities." Immediately after their release at headquarters the trio was taken by a mob to a wooded section, beaten, tarred and feathered, and then killed, the others recovered.

Ten persons, including former Police Chief R. G. Fitzworth and six members of the police department, have been indicted in the case. The former chief was charged with being an accessory after the fact. The nine others were charged with second degree murder and kidnaping.

Tomkins was a witness before the Grand Jury and named as a state witness for the prosecution.

M. I. T. PLANS COURSE IN TEXTILE RESEARCH

A special intensive course in textile research designed to meet the requirements of executive, research directors, and others participating in this field of manufacture will be given at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology beginning on March 20. It was announced today.

The course, the eighth of its kind offered by the institute, will be limited to 20 members to insure the most efficient use of the textile laboratory facilities.

In order that executives and researchers who have largely made up the membership of the class in the past, may conveniently attend the entire work of the course will be concentrated into lectures and laboratory work on Friday and Saturday of each week for six consecutive weeks. Conference will be arranged at convenient periods.

The first group of twelve lectures will be devoted to textile analysis, including discussions of the character and necessity of textile testing; design of textile testing factors; tests; bone dry tests; conditioning apparatus; current methods of moisture testing; auxiliary apparatus; textile testing machines; special tests; testing machines; and the measurement of special properties of fabrics.

The second group of twelve lectures will be devoted to textile microscopy and will include discussions of textile microscopes and how to use them; light and the microscope; specimen mounting; the theory and application of textile microscopy; and rapid and precision sectioning of fibers, yarns and fabrics. Color as it applies to textile microscopy, micrography and photomicrography of textiles and the micro-analysis of textiles, yarns and fabrics will be considered.

Registration for the class will close on March 16. Members will be registered as special students and upon successful completion of the course will be given a certificate of credit in textile technical analysis and textile microscopy. The course will be given under the direction of Professor George H. Haven and Edward R. Schwarz.
