Comparison Of January-February Reports Shows Elm City In The Lead.

New Haven has established the best traffic accident experience of any city or town in the state in a 1935-36 comparison, according to the records of the state department of motor vehicles as of Monday.

The daily traffic accident report for Monday of this week shows a total of 3702 accidents as compared with 2,390 for the same period last year, forty-five fatalities against forty-three and 3,427 injuries as compared with 1,574.

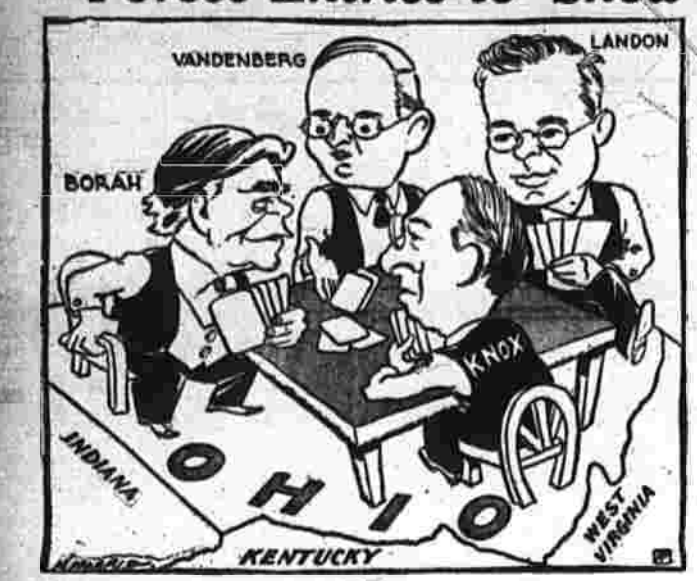
