After a few isolated riots set off general street fighting in leading cities of Syria, nationalist leaders lost control of the street mobs and concentrated their attack on the French High Commissioner, Count Damien de Martel, urging his removal from office.

Much of the nationalist support comes from the universities where students are divided into two sections. One group demands only freedom for jailed classmates while the other refuses to be satisfied with anything but the complete and immediate independence of their country. 
