KING EDWARD MAY WED, HINT IN A MESSAGE Britons See Purpose in Decree on Need of Revision of Civil List; Laborite's Quiz Is Ignored.

London, March 11.—(AP)—The possibility that Edward VIII, bachelor King of England, may be officially announced in the House of Commons today in a message from the monarch, was the subject of a quiz by the Labor Party members in the British Empire and the world at large.

As Prince of Wales, he was termed "The world's most eligible bachelor." Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, read a royal decree to the assembled legislators in which Edward VIII was named as the monarch.

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France Threatening To Quit The League Unless Britain Acts

Washington, March 11.—(AP)—The constitutionality of a blanket Senate lobby committee subpoena for telegrams of the Chicago law firm of Winston, Strawn & Moore was challenged today in the District of Columbia Supreme Court.

The first legal clash between the lobby investigators and some of their chief critics, Francis C. Hogan, veteran of many fights with Senate committees—argued arguments in the case.

Justice Chief Justice, Alfred C. Wheat for a permanent injunction to prohibit the Western Union Telegraph company from surrendering his client's messages.

The court was packed from wall to wall as Hogan quitted the case. He argued that the subpoena was "unreasonable and oppressive" and that the government had no right to search the messages.

Selection of Lajoie may bring some criticism, since he played during most of his career in the American League. But he was with the Phillies long enough to convince me all what a great player he was.

How About Honus Wagner? I debated whether to place Tinker or Herman Long at shortstop. I believe they were almost on a par, and I finally chose Tinker.

In selecting this team I have considered ability, the will to win, brainwork, and whether the player really liked baseball or just played the game for the financial return.

For those reasons, it is only natural that I would select three Pittsburgh players. I was closely associated with them, knew their habits, their temperaments, and everything about them.

What a pair of catchers King and Bresnahan would make on any big league team today! Bresnahan was the first catcher. If I recall correctly, to wear shin guards, and he was a tower of strength in the Giant lineup for many years. King for breakfast today with only one small riot to mark their going.
