French Spokesman Declares "We Will Not Discuss Peace" as Parley of Locrano Signatories Begins.

London, March 12.—The French announced today that, unmoved by a German threat to seek isolation, they would insist absolutely on the removal of German troops from the Rhineland.

The announcement came as delegates from the Locrano treaty signatories met today in Paris to discuss a copy of a telegram to the Senate which informed sources said they believed sought a middle course of action in the present crisis.

There was no immediate official hint as to what the British plan contained, but it was believed that it stopped short of laying down an ultimatum to Germany to remove its troops from the long-demilitarized zone.

A French spokesman declared: "We shall not discuss the 'peace proposal' made by a power which has broken treaties until the broken provisions of those treaties are restored."

British Caution

The British were understood to be insisting that the situation be handled by the long-demilitarized zone. The British argument, it was said, did not change the French position.

Said the French spokesman: "We are not interested in Hitler's proposals as long as his troops stay on the Rhine."

The British policy developed from three successive meetings of Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin's Cabinet, in the absence of diplomatic circles, while statements by the Locrano powers assembled for discussions on which peace was being sought.

The foreign minister, Pierre-Rene Flandin, demanding a re-reading of the Locrano treaty, left bank of the Rhine before the powers considered the offers of new terms which Adolf Hitler would accept simultaneously with the violation of the Locrano pact.

The British position was understood to be that the case could be heard on its merits as soon as possible.

In the petition, Hearst alleged a copy of a telegram had been obtained from the Locrano powers, which the Communications Commission had been sent by Hearst to an editor, instructing the latter to prepare a series of editorials for submission to Hearst for approval.

FOES TRY TO KILL SPANISH LEADER

Attempt at Assassination Fails; Political War Spreads in Nation.

Madrid, March 12.—(AP)—A daring attempt to assassinate the Spanish foreign minister, Prof. Luis Jimenez Azaña, failed today. Spain's anti-current of political and religious disorders today was new menacing.

The attack on Jimenez, as he left his home this morning, was believed to be the result of the death of a Fascist student yesterday and the wounding of two others.

A group of four or five men opened fire on the professor from an automobile as he was departing from his home to go to his law classes at the Madrid University.

A policeman scoring the professor was hit and wounded seriously. Jimenez rushed back into his house, unharmed, despite the hail of 20 shots which rained about him and his escort.

The assailants' car sped off without police being able to overtake it.

The under-current of "civil war" between Rightists and Leftists, arising from the Leticia election victory and assumption of government power by the latter, has been intensifying the other of instigating the disorders.

HEARST SEEKS INJUNCTION IN WIRE SUBPOENA

Attacks Lobby Committee's Seizure of Telegrams on the Ground of Press Freedom; Cites Single Dispatch.

Washington, March 12.—(AP)—William Randolph Hearst filed in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia today a petition seeking to prevent the Western Union Telegraph Company from delivering a copy of a telegram to the Senate lobby committee.

Chief Justice Alfred A. Sutherland yesterday enjoined the telegraph company from turning over to the lobby committee a copy of a telegram received by the Chicago law firm of Hamilton, Strawn, and Douglas, which was refused to sign an immediate restraining order on the Hearst suit. He had been refused to hear the case on its merits.

Under this proposal, it was argued that corporations could lay aside moderate portions of their profits and work relief as opposed to the dole and likewise unanimous on the necessity for continuing WPA.

In order to cover both objectives, Senator Robinson (D., Ark.), declared that he would support the plan if it included a provision for the equalization of the tax on the part of the States.

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TWO BILLIONS ASKED TO HELP UNEMPLOYED

Mayors of 100 Largest Cities in Nation Put Proposal Before President — Are Against Dole.

Washington, March 12.—(AP)—An additional \$2,340,000,000 to continue works relief during the next fiscal year was proposed to President Roosevelt today by the United States Conference of Mayors.

The mayor's conference, embracing the heads of 100 largest cities of the country, said it was unanimous in endorsing the policy of work relief as opposed to the dole and likewise unanimous on the necessity for continuing WPA.

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REACH AN ACCORD IN MILK DISPUTE

State Producers to Vote Next Week on Two Questions Instead of Three.

Hartford, March 12.—(AP)—After weeks of controversy a way was cleared today which may settle the long-running dispute between the State Milk Producers' Association and the State Milk Marketing Board.

Milk Administrator S. McLean Buchanan announced today that he had reached an agreement with the producers' association on the terms of a new agreement.

Under the agreement, the State Milk Producers' Association will be allowed to sell their milk to dealers or to the State Milk Marketing Board at a price of their own choosing.

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VISITORS' BOARD BACKS UP FRANK

Advisory Group Defends Wisconsin College Head in Report to Regents.

Madison, Wis., March 12.—(AP)—The educational status of Frank J. Murphy, Wisconsin State University, was defended today in a report of the board of visitors to the Wisconsin State Board of Regents.

The board of visitors, which was organized by the State Board of Regents, in the wake of published reports that Murphy was leaving the university, issued a report today which defended Murphy's position and recommended that he be allowed to continue his duties.

The report stated that Murphy's position was a "visiting professor" and that his duties were of a temporary nature. It also stated that Murphy's record was excellent and that he was a valuable member of the faculty.

EAST, MIDWEST THREATENED BY HEAVY FLOODS

The High, Delaware, Schuylkill, Juniata, Allegheny, Susquehanna, Potomac, Chesapeake, Connecticut, Chesapeake and Cochoctonic rivers all were at flood stage today, and smaller streams added their quota of roiling waters and jam in ice.

Rescuers at Hollisday, Pa., saved one family from a burning house, and many families were forced to flee their homes in scattered parts of Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

REICH MUST MOVE SOLDIERS' FRANCE; BRITAIN CAUTIOUS

French Spokesman Declares "We Will Not Discuss Peace" As Parley of Locrano Signatories Begins.

London, March 12.—The French announced today that, unmoved by a German threat to seek isolation, they would insist absolutely on the removal of German troops from the Rhineland.

The announcement came as delegates from the Locarno treaty signatories met to discuss the plan which informed sources said they believed sought a middle course of action in the present crisis.

There was no immediate official hint as to what the British plan contained, but it was believed that it stopped short of laying down an ultimatum to Germany to remove its troops from the long-demilitarized zone.

Said the French spokesman: "We are not interested in Hitler's proposals as long as his troops stay on the Rhine." The British policy developed from the actual unilateral treaty violation by Germany, which was not considered the offer of new terms by the Locarno signatories.

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EAST, MIDWEST THREATENED BY HEAVY FLOODS

Many Rivers Overflow Banks—Highways Blocked by Huge Ice Cakes— Vermont Hard Hit.

Hard rains and melting snow and ice sent streams of the east and parts of the middle west to flood levels today, sweeping away one bridge, inundating highways and farm lands and endangering homes, stock and life, and forcing many thousands of people to evacuate their homes.

Twenty-four hours of precipitation in the north and west, including Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine and New Brunswick, made an average of 1.5 inches of rain.

The Lehigh, Delaware, Schuylkill, Juniata, Allegheny, Susquehanna, Potomac, Chesapeake, Connecticut, Choptank and Cobscook rivers all were at flood stage today, and many smaller streams added their quota of relief water to the main flow.

An old covered bridge was swept away by waters of the Housatonic at Cornwall Bridge, Conn. Rescuers at Hollisburgh, Pa., saved one family from drowning. In New York, many homes were forced to evacuate their occupants.
