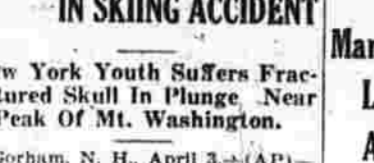

**NORTH END FIREMEN FORMED 47 YEARS**

**Today Marks Anniversary Of Town's First Fire-Fighting Organization.**

Today marks the 47th anniversary of the organization of the Manchester fire department. It was on April 3, 1889 that a meeting called by Clarence Allen, was held and subscriptions from residents of the north and raised which made possible the purchasing of 500 feet of hose. The meeting was called by Mr. Allen, now dead, because he was of the opinion that there should be better fire protection at the north end. The fire had just destroyed the Scott building which contained at that time a drug store conducted by Charles Rose, a law office on the second floor conducted by the late Olive H. Wood and also the branch of the New England Telephone exchange as well as a telegraph office. In the same building was located the Manchester Hotel. Houses Hotel was saved by hanging wet blankets along the east side of the building and by lighting the fire with buckets of water. It was one of the most serious fires to Manchester up to that time. Mr. Allen called a meeting of the business men and other residents of the north end and the Manchester Fire Company and an agreement was reached to provide water from the hydrants at a much lower rate than is being paid today. All ready to start the company. The money that was raised resulted in the order being placed for 500 feet of hose and a pump. Mr. Allen was elected as chief. He continued as chief until succeeded later by John F. Sheridan, James H. Williams, William H. Chittin and in turn was succeeded by Thomas J. Smith, John F. Limerick and Edward Coleman.

**20 NEW FAMILIES HERE SINCE FLOOD**

In a canvass of the different real estate offices in Manchester today, the insurance offices where industrial insurance is collected and in other sources it seems that about 20 families have moved to Manchester since the flood hit East Hartford. Others have looked for rents in Manchester, but no houses of rented design or rental was available. Many have come to Manchester looking for rents at not more than \$10 or \$12 a month, of which there are but few in Manchester.

**STAFFORD SPRINGS**

Stafford Springs, April 3.—The final net grand list for the town of Stafford as corrected by the Board of Relief, exemptions deducted, for 1935 was \$6,472,624. The total non-resident list was \$941,614, while the total resident list amounted to \$5,531,010. The net assessed valuation, exemptions deducted, was \$6,472,624. The exemptions to ex-service men, their relatives and the blind was \$119,419. The gross assessed valuation was \$6,591,885. The ten per cent additional penalty amounted to \$12,690, and there were 1,249 dwelling houses in Stafford, valued at \$2,561,230. According to the Grand List there are 1,249 dwelling houses in Stafford, valued at \$2,561,230. Private garages, etc., numbered 1,176 with a valuation of \$293,312. House lots and building lots numbered 7,650 and are valued at \$739,342. Buildings used for business, commercial, mercantile and trading purposes but not for manufacturing number 135 with a valuation of \$524,075. The mills and manufacturing in Stafford are valued at \$883,600 and number 19. The lands in town consist of 32,722 acres and is valued at \$104,708. Motor vehicles and aircraft are valued at \$375,746 and number 1,468. Machinery, water power and dams are valued at \$40,600. There are 154 horses, asses and mules, including 100 ponies, valued at \$5,850. Next cattle, including purebreds, are valued at \$27,800 and number 890. Sheep, goats, ewing and poultry are valued at \$4,077. Carriages, wagons and bicycles are valued at \$708. Watches, diamonds and other jewelry in Stafford reaches a total of \$2,600. Furniture, libraries and musical instruments are entered in the abstract for \$27,204. Farming implements and machinery are valued at \$4,710. Goods of manufacturers, merchants and traders amount to \$489,836. \$130,800 is the figure that the cable, comm. poles, towers, underground mains and wires are valued at.

**NO TYPHOID FEVER CASES IN TOWN**

**Stories Of Epidemic Are Baseless Rumors Says Board Of Health.**

Recurring rumors of typhoid fever epidemic in Manchester were strongly denied again today by Board of Health officials. Miss Jessie M. Reynolds, contagious disease nurse employed by the local health board, said today there is no case of typhoid fever in Manchester. During the fortnight since the East Hartford flood refugees were brought to the State Armory here various baseless rumors of epidemics have been spread through the town.

Parker, Burlington County detective chief, once again lived to prominence by his activities in the Lindbergh kidnaping case, believes his mind is lighter than the fat in crime detection. His record is something like 200 successful cases with electrocutions or hanging in 121—a performance which has brought him praise from police all over the land. He is a short, thick-set man, gray now at 62, with a brilliant smile, twinkling blue eyes, a disarming manner and strong capabilities. He has had fifteen children, eight of whom survive. He likes to keep his own counsel, and for years has preached the superiority of reason, intuition, tolerance and persuasion to the third degree. He is commonly attributed to some police authorities.
