ORDERS STEEL CO. TO REINSTATE MEN

Labor Relations Board Acts On First Case Against Big Corporation.

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—Touching the giant steel industry for the first time, the Labor Relations Board today ordered the Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporation of Pittsburgh to reinstate ten employees the board said had been discharged for union activity.

The company contended the ten were let out for inefficiency and violation of rules.

The board decided they either were union officials or had been active in soliciting new members and distributing union literature.

Labor men here expected the order to be challenged in court. At the board's hearing, the company contended the Wagner labor-dispute act was unconstitutional.

The decision described in detail the effort of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, an American Federation of Labor Union, to get a foothold in the company's Allegheny, Pa., plant.

"These efforts were countered by systematic terror," the board said. "Officers of the union and organizers who came into Allegheny were followed about by the private police of the respondent—the J. and L. Steel Co."

"The more important union officials were honored by the respondent with permanent shadows and were followed even into the neighborhood of Allegheny."

MOTHER OF "STAR" IS NOW MISSING
Mrs. Bartholomew's Lawyer Believes That She Is Hiding Him Today.

New York, April 10.—(AP)—Two private detectives searched today for Mrs. Lillian Mae Bartholomew, a mother of the DeLois Bartholomew, the boy motion picture actor.

Her attorney, Philip A. Levy, who hired the detectives, expressed belief that Mrs. Bartholomew was "hiding him."

Levy, who said he had been retained to assist Mrs. Bartholomew to regain custody of her 10-year-old son, said he had not yet been informed of the whereabouts of the boy.

Mrs. Bartholomew could not be found at the hotel where she first said she was going and a letter received yesterday by Levy, signed "L. M. Bartholomew," said the client who arrived Wednesday from England.

"Before seeing you re the legal aspects of this case I have decided to visit Washington," Levy said, "and a traveling time tonight. You will find me at the hotel where I am staying. Meanwhile, please do nothing."

The legal guardian of Freddie was granted several months ago by a California court to the boy's aunt, Mrs. Millicent Bartholomew.

Gets Radio Message

The presumed lawyer said Mrs. Bartholomew radioed him before her ship arrived.

"Please refrain from meeting him," Levy told her.

Falling to reach her, he notified a firm of English lawyers associated with him, and said they called to reply.

"Have contacted husband who repudiates Hobbs and implors his wife to connect with you as quickly as possible," Levy said.

The reference to "Hobbs" apparently meant Joseph C. Hobbs, a London broker, described as a friend of the Bartholomew family, who was aboard the ship with Freddie's mother.

When the ship docked he told reporters: "You know, the more lawyers we can keep out of this, the better. Mrs. Bartholomew is planning to go to Hollywood to make an appeal to her husband's sister to relinquish the guardianship of Freddie. If unsuccessful, in that she said she would fight for possession of him in the courts and perhaps even appeal to Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt."
