"Thomas H. Sullivan, special committee counsel, was understood to be on the way to California to assist Messrs. Gavanan and Collins. Many members of Congress, both Democrats and Republicans, have expressed themselves privately that the investigation should be pushed to a speedy conclusion before the adjournment of Congress.

"Representative McGroarty, of California, ex-leader of the Townsend bloc and who sponsored the legislation of the Townsend plan law, said he believed the hostility of the investigating committee is unfair and unjust and that it would not retard the movement one bit; that it would continue to grow despite the investigation, or what it discloses."

## 97 MILLION RIDE STREET CAR, BUS YEARLY IN CONN.

Evidence both as to the effects of the depression in street railway operation in Connecticut, and also as to the important position of the street car and bus in the field of urban and interurban transportation is furnished in statistics contained in the 1935 report of the Connecticut Public Utilities Commission. These figures when compared with those contained in previous commission reports show that while the Connecticut Company and the Bristol Traction Company carry millions less passengers per year than was the case in the peak year 1928 they still carry a total of approximately 97,000,000 passengers annually (exclusive of 21,000,000 transfer passengers).

In other words, upwards of 230,000 riders a day depend on street transit facilities for their transportation requirements.

The passenger vehicles operated by street railway companies in Connecticut, the report reveals, run about 20,000,000 miles per year, which is a decrease in operating mileage of about 4,000,000 miles from that of 1928. Allotment of route, however, has undergone a substantial increase in the past two years and service has extended, particularly with reference to bus routes.

That Connecticut street railways have suffered losses in passengers during the past several years may be accounted for by several reasons, among which are the following: Increased use of the private automobile due to lower prices and general improvements and constant improvement of highways; deflection of traffic from the transportation companies by private individuals in giving rides to friends and by picking up strangers in their autos; the

New York, April 14—(AP)—An 18-year-old Missouri farm boy who won and then lost Eddie Cantor's \$5,000 peace essay contest because he had plagiarized almost every word from an article by a college president, still had grounds for argument today—but wasn't in the mood.

Cantor, the comedian, failed to specify in the announcement of the contest that the essays should be original compositions. He merely called for "500 words or less expressing your answer to the question, 'How can America stay out of war?'"

Lloyd Lewis, the winner-loser, whose entry picked by four college presidents as the best of 212,000, frankly admitted yesterday he was doing anything that wasn't his own.

"I didn't think I was being anything wrong," said Lloyd. "I was looking up a lot of magazine articles on the same subject in the library and then I picked out what I thought was best."

Lloyd, who lives near Plattsmouth, Mo., never had been more than 25 miles away from his home until he was brought to New York a week ago to be feted as the winner of the New Jersey Governor's International Relations essay contest.
