Charges of politics in relief have echoed in the Senate, where attempts by Republicans to get a special committee with power to investigate them has so far proved unsuccessful. They succeeded, however, in vesting the campaign funds committee with specific authority to go into the charges.

One of the first cases before the committee may be the charge by Stephen Raushenbush, formerly chief of the Senate munitions committee that, that politics was linked with the administration of the WPA in Pennsylvania. Raushenbush said he might lay his accusations before the Senators.

The Lonergan committee begins with an appropriation of \$30,000. It has broad authority to subpoena witnesses for investigation into charges of influencing voters through patronage, Federal funds, private money, or any other means.

Similar committees have been created for each election for many years. Senator Byrnes (D., S. C.), was chairman of the committee two years ago.
