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EAST HARTFORD FIRE CUTS OFF ELECTRICITY

Short Circuit Leaves Manchester Without Power or Lights for 16 Minutes.

A pole in East Hartford that carried high tension wires from Hartford to the Manchester Electric Company caused fire this noon and at 12:27 a short circuit cut off all electrical current to Manchester.

The trouble and power was resumed in 16 minutes in sufficient quantity for commercial purposes with expectations that a full supply would be provided a short while later.

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ROAST TAX BILL IN THE HOUSE; SENATE UNSURE

Republicans Assail the Proposed Measure as Coercive; Senators Shy of Comment Pending Study.

Washington, April 24 (AP)—A Republican assault on the \$505,000,000 tax bill as a "drastic, coercive measure" today opened a second day of House debate on the complex 24-page revenue plan.

Representative Reed (R., N. Y.), added in his discussion of the bill that it would be unwise as to revenue to cover the \$100,000,000 age business expansion and make the maintenance of employment more difficult.

House debate went forward as some members of the Senate Finance committee, conferring with Treasury experts, talked of the possibility of getting the revenues requested by President Roosevelt.

In contrast to the stumpy House attendance as the bill went through its initial debate, yesterday the chamber was well filled today after Representative Reed (R., Mass.), forced a quorum call.

Reed Assails Wallace Reed began with a tirade against Secretary Wallace for a remark that the Supreme court's holding that imposing A. A. processing taxes should be returned, had permitted the greatest legal violation of the law.

Representative Bierman (D., N. Y.), asked whether a Chamber member to accuse a Cabinet member of holding the Supreme court in contempt.

Representative Warren (D., N. Y.), protesting that the bill was not proper inquiry to put to the chair, contending that the bill was a "retroactive" measure.

Members Undecided Most Senate committee members had not yet decided on the bill, although there had been some critical observations received by the committee.

Concerning Puerto Rico, however, Col. Francis Riggs, chief of the island police, recently was killed by two members of the National Guard.

Doctors Puzzled Over Strange Occurrence in Georgia School Victims Recover Quickly.

Columbia, Ga., April 24 (AP)—Physicians puzzled over a weird malady which struck 20 pupils and a teacher almost simultaneously at a school here.

Theories of mass hysteria, food or gas poisoning all were discarded in part at least by extensive investigation of the weird phenomenon and no positive cause was discovered in their stead.

The weird space of a few minutes Wednesday one child in the school yard and the others with the teacher on a second floor of the East Highlands grammar school were suddenly and violently ill. Many fainted.

They were removed to homes or hospitals where they recovered quickly with no more showing any ill effects.

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TO FIGHT ITALIANS TO THE LAST MAN

Ethiopian Say Fall of Addis Ababa Does Not Mean End of War.

Addis Ababa, April 24.—(AP)—Ethiopian government spokesmen declared today that their nation would fight the Italian invaders to the last man.

Even if Addis Ababa falls into Italian hands, he asserted, the war will be carried on with the Fascists on the defensive against Ethiopian guerrillas.

Italian reports that Ethiopian guerrillas are attacking Italian troops in the highlands.

The spokesman minimized the effects of any Italian entry into Addis Ababa, pointing out that many national and international leaders would not enter the capital, considered a "white man's town."

The fall of Addis Ababa and the loss of the capital, considered a "white man's town," would mean only loss of the two radio stations, he declared.

There was constant danger 25 or 30 miles south of Addis Ababa, he said, but the Italian army was not strong enough to attack the city.

WOUNDED TICK WAR FUGITIVE GUARDED

Mobs Threaten to Lynch Farmer Accused of Killing Two Officers in Feud.

Baton Rouge, La., April 24—(AP)—Walter Johnson, 45-year-old farmer, twice spirited away from threatening crowds after he was wounded in a gun battle that led to the capture, yesterday he killed two officers in a cattle dipping feud. Johnson was shot and slightly wounded at his home near Houma last night after he had been hunted for two days for the slaying of Sheriff W. L. Nugent and Deputy D. L. Brunson.

Feeling had been running high since the slaying Tuesday and mob formed quickly near the home of the capture. Blocking the road behind them, officers hurried the prisoner to a hospital at Alexandria, La., completely unconscious.

Another group gathered at the hospital as Johnson was carried from his bed to an automobile and rushed to this capital city another 100 miles to the southeast for safekeeping.

Dr. B. L. Calhoun, Rapides county coroner who treated a wounded man at Alexandria, said Johnson told him he heard the shots that killed Nugent and Brunson but did not fire them and did not know who shot them.

Dr. Calhoun said the farmer exclaimed his flight by being shot during the shooting and was told that the officers were dead and Johnson was being sought.

Johnson was said to have objected to the cattle dipping because it was "too noisy" and he would not go to the dip because it would be a 50 head of cattle on his 100-acre farm and drive him to the state every two weeks to rid them of ticks.

Sheriff Nugent and Deputy Brunson were killed when they sought to apprehend a man who shot from the woods at Federal agents riding leading the Johnson cattle on trucks to be dipped under court order.

Following the meeting a program of entertainment will be given and refreshments will be served.

CAMERA-SHY NATIVE KILLS PHOTOGRAPHER

San Jose, Calif., April 24—(AP)—A bearded, camera-shy man faced a murder charge today for amassing the click of a lens with a shotgun.

Peter Voss, 60, was driving his burro-driven covered wagon along a highway yesterday when Dr. Jasper Gallardo, 31, a dentist, with a camera in his hand, stopped his car to get the picture—and paid with his life.

After an examination the elderly man was pronounced "temporarily insane" by Dr. E. W. Mullin, superintendent of Agnew state hospital. The psychiatrist said Voss complained he was not paid the usual small fee for his services.

Two deputy sheriffs, Agnew A. and Frank Marty, saw the shooting. They said Voss grabbed up an old shotgun and fired through the rear of Dr. Gallardo's automobile as the dentist started to drive away after taking the picture.

The officers, who had stopped to see if the dentist was having car trouble, immediately arrested Voss. Dr. Gallardo was rushed to a hospital where he died of a head wound.
