Washington, May 8.—(AP)—Administration leaders were fighting today to back opposition in the Senate to President Roosevelt's proposal to represent Badoglio as the post of viceroy of Ethiopia first viceroy of Italy.

A proclamation of his appointment was expected to be issued soon in Rome. The new viceroy would be expected to take office in Addis Ababa and the departure of King Victor Emmanuel was expected to be completed in Addis Ababa for a probably unopposed occupation of Diredawa.

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Lakehurst, N. J., May 8.—(AP)—The Hindenburg, newest and largest of the Zeppelins, completed its first trip across the North Atlantic today in record time for lighter-than-air craft.

The giant ship was moored at the Naval Air Base here at 5:23 a. m. eastern standard time—21 hours and 53 minutes after it left its home port of Friedrichshafen, Germany.

Following the ship's late across the North Atlantic, the Hindenburg was scheduled to leave for Lakehurst at 11:00 a. m. on Saturday.

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SENSE AND NONSENSE

CARE: Watch children—Slow down—Sound horn.

COMMON SENSE: Keep on the right side of the road except when passing.

Give clear signals before turning or stopping in traffic.

Never pass on blind curves or when nearing the crest of a hill. Always be sure there is ample time and space.

Always let traffic signals stop at through streets and highways; go through all intersections slowly and only when safe.

Drive at speeds in keeping with the safety of other motorists. Experience as a driver—never last. Traffic on curves or on bad roads.
