IDEAS WITH FRINGES

One very serious trouble with President Roosevelt is that his ideas have fringes. Some of them are so deeply fringed that they are almost entirely center to them. In others the fringes are not quite so wide, but in hardly any case is there a sharp, definite edge. The fringes are the ideas side the fringes get tangled up, one interferes with the other and the result is that the sum of his ideas is a jumble of ideas.

The latest thing to command the President's interest is the revival of the heavy goods industries. And the other day he disclosed that he is in-ispation a great impulse could be given to those industries by the mass production of housing. He said that some big industrialists with whom he conferred he was sure there could be sold half a million to a million building houses if the houses were marketed at \$2,000 each. This sum the President appears to regard as an astonishingly low price for a house.

In fact there are probably already half a million to a million houses in the United States, though perhaps not as many as Mr. Roosevelt has in mind, that anybody can buy at present prices. However, what is recalled that a house isn't much good unless there is a lot to set it up on, and the home owner would have to buy a lot to buy as well as the house itself. The total of three or four thousand dollars might not strike some of the potential customers as being entirely within their means.

FRASIER-LEMKE TEST

About the time this newspaper goes to press today the House of Representatives will have under consideration a measure of far-reaching importance—the Frasier-Lemke bill. The gist of this bill is that the United States currency of the new United States currency constituting a fund to be used in re-constituting the independence of farmers. The money would be loaned on mortgages at the interest rate of one-and-one-half per cent, with another one-and-one-half per cent to be paid annually in liquidation of the indebtedness. It is calculated that this would relieve the agricultural interest of the country of a very large part of its debt burden and release many millions of dollars each year to be added to the purchasing power of the farm population.

The bill has been hurried for a long time in the Rules Committee of the House. Recently the signature of a majority of the House membership was obtained for a petition forcing the bill as to whether the bill should be taken from the committee and brought to the floor of the House for final action. The bill is now set for the vote of the House.

If the vote is favorable and the committee is discharged from consideration, the bill will be called up tomorrow for six hours of debate to be followed by a vote on the measure. The bill will be seen that the Frasier-Lemke bill, if it is to pass the House, will be the first of its kind in a row within twenty-four hours of a June 1st.

The administration is bitterly opposed to the bill, since it squarely opposes the monetary policy to which Mr. Roosevelt has adhered ever since the fall of 1933, that the sole power to issue and control money lies with the privately owned Federal Reserve system, and that whatever funds the government may use in the monetary program must be borrowed from the public.

Perhaps the shabbiest reason ever advanced for the defeat of a highly important, perhaps vital piece of legislation is that advanced by the Democratic whip, Representative Boland of Pennsylvania, when he said, "Democrats should think twice before voting to support a Republican measure which would take the money out of the hands of the people and put it in the hands of a few."

New Radio Discovery Puts Television Nearer

Cleveland, O., May 11.—(AP)—A new radio discovery which makes television a step nearer by bringing "forbidden" portions of the radio spectrum into practical use was announced today before the convention of the Institute of Radio Engineers.

The device, as outlined, is a radically new alignment of the radio waves which go out from a transmitter, or policeman, of the electrical currents in a broadcasting set. Simple in design, as described by F. D. Zottis of the Radio Corporation of America's research laboratory, it makes possible the everyday use of very short radio waves, since they now can be controlled closely.

Short waves, or ultra high vibrations of the electrical currents, are the portion of the broadcasting band which scientists are using in practical television now under way, since they are relatively free from static and are not used in ordinary broadcast.

Research into everyday use of these short waves has been retarded, Zottis explained, because the power from a group of radio tubes radiated rapidly on a given wavelength, making them undependable for broadcasting.

Successful control of the power output on these short waves is vital to their successful use, he added, and the new tube arrangement offers the possibility of controlling them in the same way that crystal sets are used in sound broadcasts.
The power of a radio impulse on these short waves has been increased or decreased at the will of the operator by means of sliding of the tuning of the apparatus, Zottis declared.
