tion of these funds it was possible to care for an increased number of pa-tients and none were turned away.

Conservative estimates this year in dicate that at least \$15,000 will be needed to provide equal care for an equal number of patients.
Curtailment in this amount will only mean that patients will receive poorer care. Patients cannot pay more than they do now on the average and the trustees will not allow a deficit to be incurred. The hospital title is clear now and there are no debta outstanding against the no debts outstanding against the hospital. All money received is used exclusively to provide care for

patients in the aggregate.

Purchased Equipment

During the depression years, due
to the rigid economies enforced upen the hospital management, the
hospital nursing staff and friends
have held dances and parties in order to secure funds with which to
burchase much-needed hospital or to secure funds with which to purchase much-needed hospital squipment which could not have otherwise been secured. Some of the larger items were a Maternity table, operating room lights, replacing the antiquated lights used for many years, and a portable X-ray and other smaller, articles needed for several years. This cooperation of staff and willing friends of the hospital is reflected in the extra benefits possible to the future patients.

the hospital is reflected in the extra benefits possible to the future patients.

The hospital building is 15 years old and repairs are being needed more each succeeding year. Extensive repairs have been made during this past two years within the building and savings in fuel costs were effected through the installation of an automatic furnace stoker. During the first year of operation over \$150 in savings were effected through the installation of the automatic stokers.

Handicapped by lack of available hands, the trustees of the hospital have been unable to keep pace with the census increase of the hospital by additions to the building or to the nurses quarters, both badly needed. The maternity service has constantly increased, due in a measure to the out-patient clinic, but no idditional space has been available in this department. The trustees have had visions of an extra wing which could be divided into house maternity cases on one foor, and a pediatric ward on another, but funds will not permit.




