FRAZIER-LENKE DEBAT
The defeat of the Frazier-Lenke
bill in the House of Representatives
yesterday was a great surprise to
many observers. It is highly prob-
able that the bill will be re-
introduced in the next Congress,
and that it will be the subject of
a new hearing.

The bill, which was introduced
by Representative Frazier of New
York, and amended by Lenke of
Ohio, provided for the creation
of a new department of labor,
to be known as the Department
of Labor and Industry. The bill
also provided for the creation of
a new department of commerce,
to be known as the Department
of Commerce and Industry.

The bill was defeated by a vote
of 217 to 207. The vote was
split along party lines, with the
Republicans voting 100 to 90 in
favor of the bill, and the Demo-
crats voting 117 to 117 against
it.

FARLEY DEFENDS ROOSEVELT POLICY

Tells Vermont State Convention There Are No Longer Republican States.

Barre, Vt., May 14.—(AP)—Declaring that "there is no longer any such thing as rock-ribbed Republicanism," Chairman James A. Farley of the Democratic National committee today outlined his policy for Vermont and the nation had derived from the Roosevelt administration.

Addressing the state convention of the party, which will name six delegates to the national convention at Philadelphia, Farley said critics of the administration had themselves "confronting the undeniable fact" that business in every section of the country is improving.

Declaring Vermont business continues "making good" for the first time in years, Farley continued: "This business recovery is the direct result of the wise policies inaugurated by the Roosevelt administration."

"I go further than that and say it would be dangerous for this country if the deflation curve had been allowed to continue," Farley said, "and if the do-nothing policies of the Hoover administration had been allowed to continue in force."

Defending the relief administration and assailing its critics, he said: "If these self-appointed and so-called leaders had anything to say at the time of the great crisis, no one remembers it. In fact, the country is on its feet again, they rush out of hiding and praise the days of the Roosevelt administration."

He declared the conference of mayors unanimously praised the work of the Roosevelt administration. "To you realize now why the Republican national committee and the Dupont Liberty League, and the hotheads always keep silent regarding this report of the mayors."

He said it had been "conservatively estimated" that the Federal government, during depression years, allotted, lost, spent, or mislaid over \$2,000,000,000 in Vermont, and asked that consideration be given to the effective work done by that \$2,000,000,000 in protecting your homes, your savings, and your business during the last few years."

Describing the American Liberty League as "a sport model of the Republican National committee," Farley declared "both cars are headed down the same blind alley and both will arrive at the same disastrous end."

NEW LONDON'S STRIKE IS BEING CONTINUED

Majority of the Workers Still Out—To Try to Reach an Accord Tomorrow.

New London, May 14.—(AP)—Continuing their strike against a 12 per cent wage reduction, the majority of workers of the New England Colgate Tube and Sheet Co., here remained away from work today despite efforts of the management to obtain a full working force for operating the company's plants.

Pickets continued their march in front of the company's property, and Edward Michael, president of the New London Central Labor Union, said today that the workers who pledged allegiance to a tubemaker union remained steady.

It was announced that 215 workmen were employed in the plant when a shutdown because of a number of employees to report for work and Michael said "215 went to work today." He claims a union membership of 175 men and women.

Michael asserted that representatives of State Labor Committee Joseph Jones will come to this city tomorrow in an effort to settle the strike.

The management of the company has refused to discuss the strike situation with representatives of the strikers and has announced that the wage reduction will be in effect when full operations are resumed.

PROFESSOR INJURED

Danbury, May 14.—(AP)—William P. Boeding, 84, of Stamford Springs, retired professor at the Yale School of Forestry, is in a critical condition at the Danbury hospital today as a result of injury sustained yesterday afternoon when his automobile crashed into a tree in Ridgefield.

The aged man suffered abdominal injuries and a broken kneecap, according to hospital authorities. He underwent an operation last night after he had been given a blood transfusion.

BANK OF FRANCE LOSING ITS GOLD

Over 181 Millions Withdrawn During Week of May 8 Report Shows.

Paris, May 14.—(AP)—The flight of capital after the Lictorial victory in the recent Parliamentary elections drained 2,730,000,000 francs (\$438,000,000) in gold from the Bank of France during the week ending May 8, a bank statement revealed today.

The loss, the highest this year, increased the lowering of the gold reserves to 7,670,000,000 francs (\$1,277,000,000) since March 20. The remaining gold stock, valued at \$2,029,000,000 francs (\$334,849,200), was further reduced by the outflow of several hundred million francs, said financial circles, because of the bank's unofficial restrictions on currency transactions last week.

The loss in the bank's vaults, totaling 80,258,000,000 francs on May 10, is the largest since 1927, and 27 per cent within a year.

The large amount of disinvestment by commercial and government banks reported meanwhile indicated that the bank still was being supplied with treasury funds, said financial authorities.
