Rarely are native strawberries ready for market before the first of June. This morning at Gollitzer's farm, however, the berries were picked. Although Mr. Gollitzer does not count a roadside stand and several quarts were placed on display today, he notes that the berries are of the Howard 17 variety which is the earliest strawberry. They grew from plants one year old. Plants that were planted last year were ready to bear early. Mr. Gollitzer believes that a record for early strawberry picking was set this year. Mr. Gollitzer also includes the mistake in regard to the frost that killed many plants last year. It seems that the frost was not so early as it was reported to be.

### MIZE CHIEF RIVAL OF YANKEE PHENOM

**Cards' First Sacker Seems Due to Give Di Maggio Race for Rook Honors.**

St. Louis, May 26—(AP)—Slugging Johnny Mize, magna cum laude graduate of the St. Louis Cardinals chain gang, today loomed as the chief rival of New York Yankee slugger Jimmie Foxx as the favorite to lead the Red Sox to their first pennant in 1936.

The "Big Boy" Mize, 27, has been hitting home runs and driving in runs at an amazing rate since he was traded to the Sox from the Cardinals last September.

He has 12 home runs and 20 runs batted in, in 12 games. He is hitting .357 with a .700 slugging average.

Di Maggio, 34, has been hitting home runs and driving in runs at a slower rate since he was traded to the Sox from the Yankees last September.

He has 8 home runs and 12 runs batted in, in 12 games. He is hitting .261 with a .500 slugging average.

Both players are expected to play a major role in the Sox' campaign to win the pennant.

SCIENTIFIC MOP FUSHER CONSERVES HIS ENERGY

Chicago, May 26—(AP)—Martin F. Young, student at the University of Chicago, mops floors to help pay his tuition costs—but he is no mere mopper. He has reduced the time to scientific equation and sets forth his theories on kinetic energy consumed in the job in an article on mopping technique.

Less intelligent moppers. Young says, "I use the mop to the end of each stroke and have to bang on it to stop it before reversing direction. This, he says, is wasted energy. A less vigorous, circular motion is preferable."

The chief value of mopping, Young says philosophically, "is the physical value the mopper gets from it."
