

If he is not known, ne or two witnesses who know the eteran and who are also known to he certifying officer must sign the ond in the presence of the certifying officer. Space is also provided in the bonds for taking fingerprints a exceptional cases. Each bond will be stamped with the postoffice stamped by nurched with a special punch d punched with a special punch ovided by the Treasury depart-

rovided by the Treasury department.

Care In Signing
The veteran must use care in signing his bonds. His signature must appear on the bond EXACTLY as it is carried on the face of the bond. This regulation, as the others preceding, will be rigidly enforced.

When the bonds have been accepted for payment, the owner will be given an interim receipt on which will be carried the serial numbers of each of the \$50 bonds. A large amount of work will necessarily have to be done in filling out these receipts as many local veterans receiving \$1,500 in adjusted service certificate bonds will be entitled to 30 of the \$50 denomination bonds.

Certification of the veterans bonds will constitute a major problem in the bonus bond payment as sufficient employees must be available for the certification procedure and space must be provided by the certification and their witnesses. Postmaster Crocker has been instructed to provide a suitable space for this work, also to provide this service in a manner so as not to create congestion at the office and to eliminate complaint.

Carriers have been instructed to see every possible means of delivering the registered letters to the veteran, as is the usual procedure with registered letters. If the veteran is not known to the route carrier, the former must furnish suitable identification before the bonds are turned liver. If the veteran is known to the sarrier, no other means of identification are necessary.

The veteran will sign the registry eccipt, entering upon it his address.

Washington (AP)—Building of utvale homes has increased so rap-dly in the last half year that a milding "boomlet" is predicted for east

This year will see the construc-tion of 250,000 new homes, says Stewart McDonald, federal housing administrator. He is corroborated by the federal home loan bank beard which foresees the construc-tion of "over 200,000" new homes during the year.

Many factors contribute to this moden rush of Americans for homes of their own—some social, some financial.

financial.

Federal experts point to the ahortage of homes, estimated from 750,000 to 1,500,000, created by the depression years when new construction slumped. They also point out that there is a large "marriage reserve" among persons unable to marry during the depression; to widespread doubling-up of families which now are seeking homes of their own; to accumulated obsolescence of old homes; to the normal desire of householders to escape run-down neighborhoods, and to the return of net population movement from farms to cities.

FHA Strides Ahead

The federal new home housing program started in January, 1935, and 12,360 loans totaling \$60,245,-256 were made that year. These figures are expected to double during I in addition 708,408 loans totaling \$245,070,729 were made for the mode entiration of old homes.

Mortgages accepted by the FHA in the first three months of 1936 for home building and modernization totaled \$63,043,685, compared with \$7,070,015 in the same period last year.

Many other institutions are engaged in combatting the housing shortage. The federal home loan hank board is releasing money to building and loan associations.

FWA expects to construct 25,000 dwelling units this year at an approximate cost of \$180,000,000, These units will be, for the most part, in large apartment communities, and will be rented to those who move in.

Resettlement plans under way will provide 29,315 new homes this year. They will average in cost from \$1,407 for a three-room house to 22,500 for a six-room house.

Increased building also is anticipated by people who have the cash. Financing also is available from private banks which will lend without government security, and from private individuals who engage loaning money for home-building.





WHEN OSCAR WILDE

Dressed in Velvet Jacket, Knee Pants, He Lectured Miners in the '80s.

BOOK REVIEW

By Bruce Catton

One of the oddest items in American history is the fact that Oscar, Wilde, complete in velvet jacket, knee pants, silk hose, and flowing locks that fell to his shoulders, was able to deliver lectures on esthetics in the mining camps of the American wild west without getting abot.

He did it, back in the 80s, and —like other British lecturers, before and since—cashed in handsomely, despite the fact that his audiences never quite figured out what he was talking about.

There is a rich account of his American tour in "Oscar Wilde Discovers America," by David Lewis and Henry Justin Smith (Harcourt-Brace; 34.50).

Wilde was brought over partly as a gag. The Gilbert and Sullivan opera, "Patience," was a satire on Wilde and his cuit of esthetes. It was opening in New York, and backers felt that the American public would warm up to it better if they got a look at the man who was being satirized.

It was an odd bit of business. Wilde was pleading for a return to handcraft industry and the exaltation of the individual; lusty America, neck-deep in the era of Jim Finke and Jay Gould, was going the other way fast.

It paid its way to his lectures, wondered what he was talking about, discovered that for all his pansy manners he could drink, America's best bottle-men under the table—and then yawned and forgot him.
