BUILDING BOOM EXPECTED THIS SUMMER AND FALL

Washington (AP)—Building of private homes has increased so rapidly in the last half year that a building "boom" is predicted for 1934.

This year will see the construction of 250,000 new homes, says Stewart McDonald, federal housing administrator. He is corroborated by the federal home loan bank board which forecasts the construction of over 200,000 new homes during the year.

Many factors contribute to this sudden rush of Americans for homes of their own—more social, more financial.

Federal experts point to the shortage of homes, estimated from 700,000 to 1,500,000, created by the depression years, often new construction shopped. They also point out that there is a large "marriage reserve" among persons unable to marry during the depression; to widespread disintegration of families which now are seeking homes of their own; to accumulated obsolescence of old homes; to the normal desire of householders to escape run-down neighborhoods and to the return of net population movement from farms to cities.

New Home Owners

Building schemes inaugurated by the federal housing administration, have opened avenues to a new and a would-be home-owners. Prior to the government's entry into the field it was customary to write no mortgage for longer than 12 years.

Many of the homes were secured by first and second mortgages, necessitating periodic renewals of the trusts charges. Furthermore, most financial institutions limited their lending on homes to 60 to 65 per cent of the value of the property.

Federal housing programs last year forecast the types of homes and loans that the majority of Americans will be seeking. The average value of the new one-family home secured by federal mortgage last year was \$6,000. Terms for payment averaged between 37 and 39 years, and 7.5 per cent of those mortgages were written for 75 to 80 per cent of the value of the homes.

FEHA Strides Ahead

The federal new home housing program started in January, 1933, and 12,300 loans totaling \$60,241,296 were made that year. These figures are expected to double during 1934.

In addition \$60,486 loans totaling \$240,672 were made for the modernization of old homes.

Mortgages accepted by the FEHA in the first three months of 1934 for home building and modernization totaled \$92,945,835, compared with \$7,070,015 in the same period last year.

Many other institutions are engaged in combating the housing shortage. The federal home loan bank board is releasing money to building and loan associations.

FHA expects to construct 20,000 dwelling units this year at an approximate cost of \$180,000,000. These units will be, for the most part, in large apartment communities and will be rented to those who move in.

Resettlement plans under way will provide 20,415 new homes this year. They will average in cost from \$1,407 for a three-room house to \$2,000 for a six-room house.

Increased building also is anticipated by people who have the cash. Financing also is available from private banks which will lend without government security, and from private individuals who engage in lending money for home-building.

Political Field Marshals' Troubles Grow As They Seek 1936 Convention Harmony

Washington (AP)—Field Marshals Henry P. Fletcher and James A. Farley are rallying their forces in an effort to achieve routine party conventions in June and the campaign to follow.

Farley, the Democratic National chairman, credited with knowledge of the political situation in every corner of the nation, is writing to line up overwhelming delegate support for President Roosevelt's re-nomination at the Philadelphia convention. He knows thousands of party workers by their first names. Republican Chairman Fletcher, who took over the shattered Republican forces two years ago and now boasts a formidable G. O. P. phalanx, is working strenuously to weld all elements of the party into a harmonious unit.

Fears Convention Fight

One of Mr. Fletcher's big worries concerns a possible fight in the Cleveland convention. This might lead to a serious split in Republican ranks. The insistence of Senator Borah and some of his lieutenants that the old leadership be turned out and "more liberal leaders" be installed presents a definite challenge to the chairman's diplomatic skill.

"Smiling Jim," always avowedly optimistic, has his troubles, too. Besides the threat of Alfred E. Smith to "take a walk" and the defection of John W. Davis, Bainbridge Colby, Governor Fairbanks of Georgia and other prominent Democrats, serious factional fights loom in at least four states.

A major worry is the bitter hat between Governor Hoegler and Mayor Edward Kelly of Chicago, which threatens to cleave the Illinois Democracy. Others are the WPA squabble between the youthful Senator Bush Holt of West Virginia and Harry Hopkins, EPIC Democrat versus the McAdoo forces in California and a Minnesota intra-party fight where two Democratic factions are holding separate state conventions.

In addition to a national political organization rated by some old-line observers as the most powerful in the nation's history, Farley has the advantage of Democratic ascendancy in a vast majority of the states. All but 11 governors are Democrats.

Easier For Farley

Chairman Farley and the Democratic National committee can concentrate their attention on the single job of keeping Mr. Roosevelt in the White House. Chairman Fletcher and his committee colleagues, however, must build up a strong party organization for future conquest of a standard-bearer whose identity is now unknown.

CAPITAL LURES LAW ENACTORS FROM OLD LIFE

Washington—The effort of Senator Glass of Virginia to make Washington a better city in which to live has already won the support of many members of Congress who spend more time here than in their home states.

The matter is important perhaps only because of the influence the Washington environment may have upon the individual legislator.

Top flight members, those who have places in the national or international spotlight, often find that once they are back home they are rather out of touch with the business which in Washington occupies most of their time.

Most concede they are eager for this home period, usually in summer and fall, for two reasons paramount to others. They quite frankly want a rest among the home folk, and they face the practical necessity of keeping their party followers contented.

Hurry Back to Capital

But once they have achieved these two ends, the large percentage of them push plans to return to the capital. Those who cut a big swath in party organization or in shaping important legislation state openly they can't do their work away from the capital. Contact with fellow legislators by mail is less effective than to stroll down a corridor and drop in on a colleague to discuss plans for a bill.

It becomes apparent in time that some have become national figures quite removed from strictly home state influence.

There is another factor which attracts many members in some form or another—the capital's social life. Not infrequently those who have spent long years in Congress find

IMPROVEMENTS TO ROCKY NECK PARK

Manchesters visitors to Rocky Neck Park are enthusiastic over the improvements made in Rocky Neck Park, East Lyme, a popular resort for local residents for week-ends or half-day drives. A new WPA project involving an expenditure of \$100,000 will enable the State Park Commission to complete plans for a two-story cafeteria and lounge on the site of the old fish-house on the point adjoining the beach on the east.

Rocky Neck Park is the nearest of all the shore public resorts to Manchester and thousands of local people take advantage of the fine beach each summer. Ample parking space for cars and camping facilities for week-end trips has made a popular resort a popular one with residents of this town. With the completion of the new cafeteria during the summer it is expected that the park will become a rival of Hammonasset Beach in the town of Middletown.

The cafeteria will be two stories in height with a cafeteria on the first floor and a model restaurant on the second floor with water service. The model restaurant will be a new feature of the park. The entire effect will be in the modern, large windows in the new building and light will be provided by two large glass windows. The new section will later be able to go directly to the beach through a new entrance. Parking for 1,000 cars will be available. A rustic foot bridge over the railroad tracks leads to the recreation hall and restaurant.

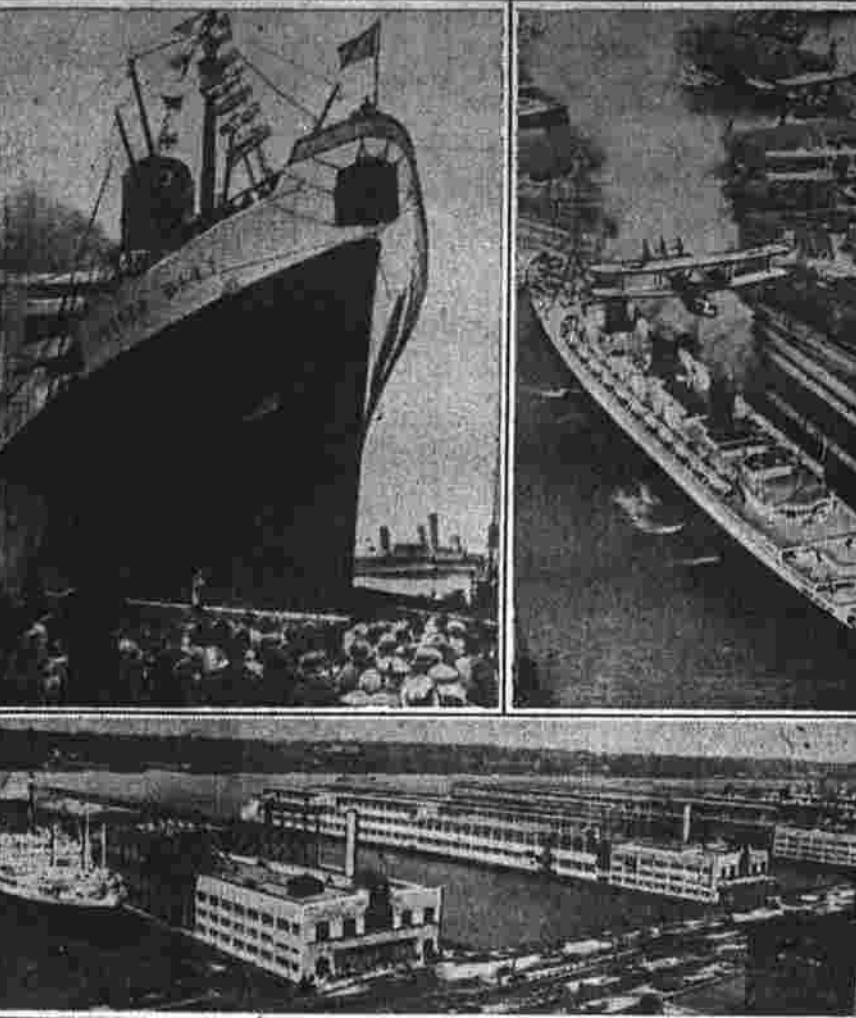
Queen Mary May Attempt Record Return Journey
